## Death of moted historian

LIMERICK'S best known historian died early this morning after a short illness.

Kevin Hannan, 77, of 16 Pennywell Road, died at 5.30am in St John's Hospital. He had been taken to the hospital a little over a week ago, but in recent years he had suffered some health problems.

Mr Hannan was a prominent local historian, and contributed articles to the Limerick Chronicle and Limerick Leader for the past 30 years, in addition to publishing several books on local history.

"He was very well read and was a descriptive writer. He could quote poetry at length, including the complete Drunken Thady.

He was a renaissance man in every sense of the word a nature lover, artist and historian.

'He was a great friend, a delightful companion, and 1 will miss him.
