TIPPERARY SETTLED ESTATE.

Yesterday in the Chancery Division, before Justice Barton, in the case of the Settled Land Act and Rochfort, Leech (instructed by Mr. Edward C. Leeson) applied on behalf of Helen Blanche Rochfort that she be at liberty to exercise the powers of sale conferred under the 63rd section of the Settled Land Act provided in a marriage settlement, dated 18th April, 1875, with respect to the lands of Leskin, situated in the barony of Clonwilliam, County Tipperary. The solicitor, counsel explained, was tenant for life of the lands, which had been conveyed to trustees on certain trusts. Mr. Leeson, who was one of the trustees, was now deceased, and the only surviving trustee was Sir John Colthurst, who had written a letter to the solicitor, agreeing to the sale of the lands. Justice Barton granted the application, making an order authorising the tenant for life to sell the property.

GRAVE BREACH OF PROMISE CASE.

Yesterday in the King's Bench Division, Mr. Justice Barton had before him a rather unusual case of breach of promise of marriage. The case was put down for hearing at the recent sittings, but it was withdrawn on the defendant refusing to fulfil his engagement. As he had not done so an application to have the case entered was granted.

SHIRAZ POOR LAW ASSOCIATION.

The annual meeting of the Poor Law Association of Ireland was held yesterday at Cork, and was numerously attended. The report showed a considerable balance in hand, and a letter was read from Mr. John Kedmond recommending the drafting of a Bill dealing with the superannuation of poor law officials.

FUNERAL OF THE LATE MR. WOULFE.

The remains of the late Mr. Michael Woulfe City-Treasurer, were removed this afternoon from St. Mary's R.C. Church for interment to Mount St. Laurence Cemetery. The cortege was of a large and representative character, testifying to the deservedly high esteem in which the deceased who for nearly half a century has been identified with civic life, was held by all classes of the community. The clergy present included Father Conway, P.P., St. Patrick's, Fr. D. Shanahan P.P., St. Mary's, Fr. Rea C.O. do., Fr. Hogan, C.C., St. Munchin's College, Fr. Creagh C.S.S.R. and Fr. Merrion C.S.S.R. The chief mourners included Misses Woulfe daughters, Mr. D. Kenneally, and some private friends. The Mayor, High Sheriff, the Town Clerk, and other officials of the Corporation, and several members of that body, as well as a large number of the general public attended. The music was draped in black. A large body of the Corporation employees were present. The monster drapery houses and other establishments had their blinds drawn while the funeral was passing.
