

the other hand, situated sixty miles in the centre of an extensive district, the most fertile in Ireland; and which in every direction, except that of Cork, of tide washing her spacious Quays, of inland navigation branching North and South, with all these advantages, pre-eminence of geographical position, as terminus of the great way to the capital. Then in the Mails, the direct trade with America, the transit is facilitated, and the dangers of navigating a great extent are avoided.

On a map; and you will find, that the natural boundaries of the country accord with the contiguity of the coast, pointing out a line, straight almost as a line. Thus also the perilous sinuosity of the coast, and expenditure of construction di-

minution also assists the comparative advantage of its central position affords to ports on the coast, over maritime ports; and the proved convenience, and swift and safe navigation of the Limerick schooners over larger vessels, to be overlooked in considering the advantages of navigation in the shallow waters.

Of remote times the rude Scandinavians seized upon with iron hands, the province of Limerick; and the sagacious statesman of the nineteenth century ratifies the choice of a more civilized and semi-barbarous colonist; nor is it surprising that another Limerick nearer the sea, the odious Roadsteads are situated between the city and the sea.

The termination of the Estuary, only the continuation of the Pier, to afford, in connection with the contiguous islands, a sheltered harbour of great extent.

The wharf of Tarbert offers a secure and extensive anchorage. And the construction of a Pier at Tarbert, to render that roadstead of greater importance than Kilrush. One hundred thousand pounds probably cover the expences of both works. The hurried observations are written in the margin of the map, which overlooks the river, about a mile from the city. It is now past midnight; a large vessel is discernible in the gloom, is anchoring at the red-room window—I hear the croaking of the oars, and the cheer of the sailors at the wind-vane. I do not think me a dreamer, if I anticipate that I shall see the Quays of this spot, and Limerick assume its station as the second city of the land.
