"Kissing the Book."

DEATH OF DR. T. J. GELSTON.

Dr. Thomas, I. Gelston, M.D., which took place at his residence, 74 George, street, this morning, after an illness of some seven weeks duration. Dr. Gelston was eldest son of the late Dr. R. "R. Gelston, and the oldest surviving member of an old and highly respected Limerick family. He was a gentleman of scholarly attributes, an eminent member of the medical profession, and of a kindly and most charitable disposition. In the City of Limerick he enjoyed an extensive practice, and his counsel was frequently sought and always respected. After reading a distinguished course he obtained his degree of Medical Doctor in the Queen's College, now the University College, Cork. He took up practice in the city, and after a brief space of time had established a reputation as a practitioner of great ability. In his time he held many public appointments, all of which he filled to the satisfaction of his authorities and with credit to himself. He was ever zealous for the welfare of his patients, and in everything that appertains the pursuit of an exacting profession he was diligent and painstaking. His public appointments, which he resigned some years ago, included a dispensary medical officership, and visting medical officer of the Limerick Male and Fenale Prisons He was also on the honorary medical staffs of the County Infirmary and Burrington's Hospital, and his work in these institutions, as indeed in every instance where his services were required, constituted him a practitioner of ripe experience and recognised ability and Socially he was a gentleman whose friendship was courted, and now that he has passed away his memory will remain green in the hearts of those who knew him best. We tender our sympathy to the members of his family in their great sorrow.

The funeral will take place on Monday morning at ten o'clock from his late residence for the family burial place St. Munchin's.
