

of this kind, yet, I assert that a system of controversy from one end or the other. Many and powerful efforts have been made by the Church of Rome to crush the Irish Society, but like a ball of tow on fire, the more it is trodden upon, the more it lights. (a laugh) For the Irish Society, the more opposition it meets, the more it takes root in the hearts of the people. While we advocate the agitation of the people, as this, we must take care to do so in a Christian spirit, bearing and forbearing. Although Sir, the Irish Society are the promoters of Christian knowledge and gospel, not by them we mean to accomplish it. The Society is merely the forerunner of religion; it paves the way for a knowledge of the Gospel in Christ, it is if I may so call it the religion. I saw a few days ago, the 84th Regiment, with their arms and tomahawks and hatchets, prepared to make way for their progress; then a body of men and officers, and I said to them, "Go to the pioneers—there goes the Irish Society, the church of God after it.—(hear, and applaud) I am now ministering to a second congregation, by its saving influence, have been made acquainted with the knowledge of the divine love, and who have been brought out of the darkness, the error, the bondage of Romanism, and from the subjection of the Pope, Bishop, and of an intrusive, interfering Prelate, but they are now a congregation of native converts, speaking their own tongue, and thanking the Father of the Almighty, for having brought them into the knowledge of truth, and the way of life. In this congregation, we are assisted by the good, the generous, the well-minded lord of the soil, Lord Ventry, and now a great many landlords who are good men, but very bad religious ones, but he is not to be used, for to use his own expression, it is not his feather in his cap to have the people ignorant of the knowledge of the truth, which can only be obtained by the word of God. Let us then endeavour to bring those whom we have gained within the fold of the Gospel, let your charity begin at home, for if it is not sincere, the question is the sincerity of it at all; and if it is not sincere, let it extend to the utmost limits of the habitable globe. We want, my friends, to remove the weight of Roman cement which keeps the heart of the people from the love and knowledge of Jesus Christ. (hear.) The meeting then concluded with a prayer, after which a collection was made in aid of the funds of the Institution.
