The House on the occasion were adjourned by the Clerk until the WEDNESDAY following.

Mr. ROSE said, he had not the least objection either to the fitness of the precedent, or the necessity of its being read. He took the opportunity to suggest, at the same time, that it would undoubtedly be found necessary for the House on Monday to proceed to the election of a new Speaker.

Mr. Hatfield then put the question, and the House adjourned to Monday.

DUBLIN, January 6.

By private and authentic letters from London, received by last Friday's packet, we learn, that his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales, disavows every kind of hereditary claim, as Heir Apparent, to become Regent; and that his Highness will accept of that high office, during the King's illness, with such limitations and restrictions as both Houses of Parliament shall think necessary, in trust for his Royal Father.

This constitutional declaration of the Prince's has, it is said, gained him the universal approbation of all ranks, as it shews that no person could prevail on his Royal Highness to adhere to a doctrine that would have ultimately overturned the British constitution, and eventually wrest from the brow of a tender Father (our still beloved Sovereign) the royal diadem, with all Kingly prerogative.

Mr. Puresoy's being brought in by the inquest on Col. Roper as incurring the verdict of Wilful Murder, is conformable to the resolution formed in several parts throughout England, that the survivor in every duel should come under that dreadful dilemma. Such was the case in Richard England's duel; and even in this city, some few years since, a matter of this sort wore a more serious aspect. No doubt a few examples of hanging, in some wanton proceedings of duelling, would have an excellent effect; and it is to be hoped the hint will not be lost on those who may hereafter sit in judgment on such matters.

Lord Delvin, now is mentioned with confidence, as a successor to the Post-mastership, vacant by Lord Chifden's death.

The introduction of the Marquis of Buckingham into our House of Lords as a Peer of Ireland, we hear, will not take place until his successor takes upon him the reins of Government.

The following notice was filed on Saturday, in the different coffee-houses in this City.

"A most melancholy scene presented itself here last Tuesday; a fine brig appeared in the Offing, not above a mile and a half from the Harbour's mouth, with her main-mast cut away, and while we were preparing to get some boats to venture out in a heavy gale, and more heavy sea, she went down, head foremost, in the view of hundreds from the shore; ten men were drowned, and one saved; the master and mate among the former.
