

impartial execution of the duties of his situation, Mr. FitzGerald gained for himself the good-will of all classes of the inhabitants amongst whom he resided; but virtue, honor, worth, and integrity could not shield him from the malignity of an informer, and the too ready attention of the Executive. The too sensitive mind of Mr. FitzGerald gave way under an excess of feeling, and after lingering for a week, death put a period to his sufferings. We envy not the feelings of the individual who occasioned this catastrophe. At 9 o'clock yesterday the remains of this much lamented gentleman were conveyed to their last home. It must have been a consolation to his amiable and interesting widow, to know the sympathy which the inhabitants of Kingston manifested for her loss, and the respect they bore her late husband, by the numerous attendance of heads of departments, respectable merchants, and other inhabitants, who followed the funeral of her generous and noble-minded husband."

Colonel Burgoyne, Mr. Rhodes, Mr. Cubitt, Mr. Griffith, and Colonel Jones, sworn in as commissioners to inspect the line of the river Shannon, and to report to Government the improvements necessary to be done on this splendid line of internal river communication, are to arrive here for that purpose next week.

At Ennistimon Quarter Sessions a Rifle soldier has been found guilty of robbing his Officer, while on detachment at Kiltrush, and sentenced to seven years transportation.—A countryman received like sentence for stabbing another at Miltown.

The Rev. Thomas Enraght, many years senior Curate of St. Mary's parish in this City, has been promoted by the Right Rev. Dr. Ryan, to the parishes of Mahoonagh and Feenagh, near Newcastle, in this county, as successor to the late Rev. Mr. Sheehan, P.P. who died on Wednesday last. The numerous poor of St. Mary's unaffectedly lament the removal of Mr. Enraght; but the idle and disorderly in that extensive district have cause to rejoice at the change.

Wednesday, a well attended Meeting of the Clergy was held at Fermoy, to promote the objects of the Cloyne Diocesan Association—the Archdeacon of Cloyne in the Chair. The Subscriptions are increasing, and both among Landlords and Clergymen the cause of the Society is gaining ground.—By the rules of the Society the Scriptures must be daily and faithfully read, and the grants to Schools be made through the medium of the Parochial Clergy. A strong impression was made on the Meeting by the Hon. and Rev. Ludlow Tonson handing to the Treasurer £50, the produce of two Hymns, composed by the Reverend Author, for the benefit of the Cloyne Association. Arrangements were made for the increase of funds, and for the inspecting of the Schools in the District.

The Rev. William Ball, who served 24 years as Curate of Clones, received this week, on promotion to the Rectorage of Rossory, an address with a piece of plate from his former parishioners.
