## THE GREAT FAILURE IN LONDON.

The extensive failure which has taken place in London, is the house of Messrs. Boldero and Co. bankers; hitherto considered not only wealthy, but of the first responsibility.

It is to be feared, from the great confidence placed in the stability of this house, to the period of its stopping payment, that many country banks and mercantile connections will receive a greater shock than has been experienced in the failure of any individual concern which has occurred during our recent commercial distresses. In the present state of things, the precise amount of the defalcation is not known; but it is estimated at 9000,000l. The banking concerns of the house were very extensive. They did business with ten or twelve country banks, principally in the North; at York, Leeds, Burton, Lincoln, Beverly, Bradford, Derby, Hull, Newcastle, Thirsk, Whitehaven, &c.

The immediate cause of the present stoppage was, we understand, an order for one of them to pay into the Exchequer a large sum, which the house was unable to comply with; and it is said, that an extent has been issued to secure the claims of government, besides the country connections already alluded to, the house kept cash for many of the public institutions, and a number of the most respectable mercantile houses, the Stock Exchange, &c. The equitable office, the Patriotic Fund, and the committee at Lloyds, and the Trustees or committee for the Strand Bridge, kept cash there.

It was the custom of this house, as well as many other Banking-houses, to advance money on securities of various descriptions, which they could not at the moment convert into cash to meet their acceptances. This circumstance, no doubt has tended to increase their embarrassments.

We understand that a meeting of the friends of the house took place on the night previous to its stopping: when it appearing that no ultimate benefit was likely to accrue from any temporary scheme of relief, the public announcement of the failure was agreed to, and declared accordingly.

Capt. Roche, who was a few days since shot in Cork by a man named O'Keefe, died on Tuesday evening, after suffering the most excruciating torture. A coroner's inquest was held on the body, who returned a verdict—"Died by a ball fired by James O'Keefe."

A reward of 337 guineas, has been offered by Lord Landaff, and the several gentlemen of the vicinity of Tipperary, for the villains concerned in the barbarous and wanton murder of Richard O'Dwyer, mill-wright.

Yesterday se'nnight, Four men were way-laid at Fenit, co. Kerry, by a gang of armed fellows, who beat them so unmercifully as to produce the death of one named Sayer, and to place the others in a dangerous state.—Four men accused of the murder have been lodged in the Jail of Tralee.

THE FAUX-PAS IN HIGH LIFE.—A great deal has been said upon the subject, which appeared in this paper a short time since. The lady adultress is now a resident in the house of her mother, who, however, only gives her a temporary asylum. Articles of separation are now preparing by a gentleman of great respectability in the profession of the law. The husband has it in contemplation immediately to apply to the ecclesiastical court, for the purpose of instituting the necessary legal proceedings to obtain a divorce. The evidence, as we before stated, is conclusive.

ANOTHER MUTINY AND MURDER AT SEA.—On the 5th of November last, his Majesty's ship Niemen, Capt. Sir Michael Seymour, captured, as she was just entering Bourdeaux, the American schooner Purse, Captain Turner, from New York, and bound for the former port, with a cargo of sugar, coffee, &c. Sir Michael sent Mr. Saunders, midshipman on board the Purse, as prizemaster, with ten men, to navigate her to Plymouth. Captain Turner, his mate, a gentleman passenger, his wife, and two boys, were left on board. During the voyage, the Americans rose upon the crew, in the dusk of the evening while four of the Niemen's men were below, and Captain Turner drew a pistol and shot Mr. Saunders dead, and threw his body overboard—he then battered down the hatches, and stood for the French coast. When they arrived off St. Quamper, they made signals of distress, and boats went off to their assistance, and carried them into port.
