On Thursday se'night, several houses in the neighbourhood of Kildysart, County Clare, were attacked at night by armed parties, and robbed of guns, &c. Major Warburton, on Sunday evening last, went in pursuit of the gang, and succeeded in securing the principals, who are fully identified, and committed to Ennis jail. Informations were previously received that nightly meetings had been held in that neighbourhood, and as the above out- rages were the first produce of those assemblies, it is hoped the prompt apprehension of the leaders will put a final stop to such lawless proceedings.

On Saturday night last, Mr. Bateman's stable and coach-house, at Tullowlands, near Askeaton, was consumed by fire, together with a jaunting car, gig, and several carts, cars, &c. It is stated to have been burned maliciously.

On Thursday night, a Gentleman passing over Thomond-bridge, was stopped at ten o'clock, by two fellows, one of whom presented a pistol at his breast, and robbed him of a guinea and half note, and some silver.

The inquests on the bodies of Patrick Collins and Mary Collopy, (as mentioned in our last,) terminated yesterday. Nothing appeared in evi- dence, after two days investigation, to induce the Jury to a conclusion that would attach suspicion to any person; and it was upon the suggestion of a Medical Gentleman, on the third day, that the following verdicts were agreed upon:

"We find that Mary Collopy was found dead in her dwelling-house, in the suburbs of this City, on the tenth day of January instant, and that her death happened in a sudden manner, but we have no positive evidence to enable us to ascertain whether her death was occasioned by poison or by suffocation.
