Waterford, Jan. 16. Yesterday arrived here
from Renew, in Newfoundland, after a tedi
ous and tempestuous passage of 67 days, the
brig Fanny, of this port, John Whelan, mas
ter, with fish, oil and passengers; during the
latter part of the voyage, they experienced
the greatest distress, having buried seven of the
passengers; the remainder with the ship's crew,
(all but the master and one of the hands,) be
ing for several days, thro' fatigue, sickness,
and want of necessaries, rendered incapable of
giving the least assistance.—They were obliged
to throw the greatest part of the fish over
board: the remainder it is supposed is so much
damaged, as to be unfit for use.—The vessel
very much disabled in her hull sails and rig
ging.

So great a fall of snow as happened last Tue
sday Night, has not been remembered in this
city these many years—in consequence of
which the Dublin and Munster mails which
were due on Wednesday morning last, have
not yet arrived.

L I M E R I C K.

We have it from the most respectable autho
rity, that the Parliament which assemble in
Dublin to-morrow, will be adjourned for a
fortnight, from the 20th Inst. by a message
from the Lord Lieutenant.

We are assured that the Right Hon. Earl
Spencer is to come over immediately as Viceroy
—the Dukes of Norfolk and Bedford both ha
ving declined accepting the Government of this
kingdom.

A few days ago was married at Bath, Ni
cholas Calvert, Esq; eldest son of F. Calvert,
Esq; of Portland Place, London, to the Hon.
Miss Frances Pery, youngest daughter of Lord
Viscount Pery, of this city.

The death of the Bishop of Elphin, mentioned
in Saturday's *Faulkner's Dublin Journal*, must
be void of foundation, as there are letters in
town from his Lordship from Dublin of the
same date.

The Dublin Mail, by way of Gowran and
Clonmel due on Wednesday last, did not arrive
until Saturday night at ten o'clock nor did the
Post which arrived last night (by same route)
bring the Dublin bag.

Sunday sen'ight two Children being left by
their Parents alone in a Cabin, on the land of
Cloverville, in this County, diverted themselves
with burning sticks, one of which communicat
ing to some flux, set that and an adjoining
Cabin in flames, in which the youngest child,
a girl about three years old, perished.

On Thursday last, the brig Mary, of Work
ington, Wm. Tiffin, master, bound for Sligo,
with a cargo of rum, sugar, and coal, was
obliged to run into this harbour, having met
most tempestuous weather which tore all her
sails—he apprehends there will be disagreeable
accounts received from the sea coasts.

When his Grace of ——— was
only an Earl, and commanded the
regiment of foot, quartered in this city, he,
after many rubs in the news-papers, was at last
brought to give the officers in garrison a dinner,
which he did at a tavern, ordering it for fifty
persons, at eighteen pence per head. The
officers heard this, and were resolved to be
even with him. They went to Mr. Macmanus,
Master of the Three Tuns Tavern, and de
fired him to prepare the dinner at one guinea
per head, and they would make up the diffe
rence, when the company was called into the
eating room, they found a first course of all
that the season could afford, a second still
more costly, and a desert of the most costly
kind. The noble Earl was astonished—and
his astonishment grew greater when Cham
pagne, Burgundy, and other the most costly
wines appeared on the board. But he durst
not make a remark. The company drank his
health, admired the splendor and magnificence
of the entertainment, which they said was
worthy the House of ———; and so well did
they relish it, that they sat to the bottle until
eight the next morning, breaking and spilling
more than they drank, in order to swell the
amount. The noble Earl retired early, sent
for the landlord, and asked him the meaning
of his giving such a dinner. The landlord
told the truth, which made his Lordship so
much ashamed of his penurious conduct, that
he desired the bill to be brought in next day,
and with a sigh discharged it. This is a well
known fact in this city.
