On Tuesday night, the house of Thomas Mangane, of Ballydahan, near Bruff, was forcibly broken open and the doors and windows entirely demolished by a party of armed insurgents, about eleven in number, who seized and carried away his niece. In a short time after he called Constables Butler and Walsh, of Captain Burke's Police, who succeeded on the same night in apprehending two principals of the gang, who are fully committed to the County Gaol.

The windows of the new Church at Ballyeahane were broken on Sunday night last, by some persons unknown.

On Thursday last, as a party of the 66th Regiment, accompanied by a Policeman, were conveying a prisoner into town, the Policeman's carbine by some accident went off, near Crossigalla, and the contents entered the leg of one of the soldiers, and also wounded the prisoner. On an investigation of the circumstances, the Policeman was liberated.

Last week, a large party of fellows visited several houses in the neighbourhood of Newtown-Ellard, in this County, under pretence of being Policemen.

In the Cork Sessions Court on Monday, four persons were tried for assaulting Mr. John De Courcy during the recent election. The prisoners belonged to Mr. Callaghan's, and the prosecutor to Mr. Hutchinson's party. The jury were confined for three hours, but from the conflicting testimony could not agree to a verdict, and they were then discharged.

Last week, a policeman was tried at the Quarter Sessions of Ennis, for assaulting an inhabitant of the town, and found guilty without leaving the box. Next day the Barrister discharged him without passing any sentence.

So decidedly averse were the minds of the Barrister and a most numerous Bench of Magistrates from the verdict pronounced by the Jury, at the late Quarter Sessions of Ennis, in the case of M'Guane v. Watkins, Chief Constable, and others, that a fine of 6d. only was levied on Mr. Watkins, and 1s. on the Constable. It appears to have been the opinion of a majority of the Bench, that the prosecutor should be indicted for perjury, for opposing to his evidence was that of Thomas Malon, John J. Fitz-Gerald, and William Daxon, Esqrs.

An inquest was held yesterday at the New Lunatic Asylum, by the Mayor of Limerick, on the body of Mrs. Cavanagh, the Matron of the Lying-in-Hospital, who had been admitted a few days since labouring under insanity.
