

actual interruption of the meetings of  
peace.

" Gentlemen of the House of Commons,  
" I have ordered the proper officers to lay  
the national accounts before you, fully relying  
upon your accustomed zeal to provide for the  
exigencies of the state and honorable support  
of his Majesty's government.

" I have also ordered an account of the ex-  
traordinary expences of government which have  
been incurred during the negotiation with  
Spain to be laid before you; and I trust you  
will find that the confidence you reposed in me  
has not been misplaced.

" My Lords and Gentlemen,

Your disposition to facilitate the business  
of commerce and to consult the ease of the mer-  
chants will induce you to consider, and if pos-  
sible to accomplish during this session, such re-  
gulations as may tend to simplify the collection  
of the various articles of the public revenue.

" Your unremitting care of the agriculture,  
trade, and manufactures of this kingdom, and  
particularly the linen manufacture, and your  
accustomed liberality to the Protestant Charter  
School and other public institutions for chari-  
table purposes, make it unnecessary for me to  
direct your attention to those objects individu-  
ally.

" A more intimate acquaintance with this  
country has increased my wishes for its welfare;  
and I have observed with the sincerest satisfac-  
tion the extension of her agriculture, her rising  
trade, and improving manufac-tures. You may  
be assured of my co-operation in every measure  
that may conduce to those important purposes;  
and while I thus fulfil his Majesty's commands.  
I shall attain the highest object of my ambition  
if I can be instrumental in contributing to the  
prosperity and happiness of Ireland."

His Excellency having retired, the Lord  
Chancellor read the Speech, and it was after-  
wards read at the table by the Clerk.

The Marquis of WATERFORD moved, that  
an humble address be presented to his Majesty,  
expressive of the thanks of this House for his  
communication of the convention with Spain;  
as also a condolence on the death of his Royal  
Highness the Duke of Cumberland:—the rest  
of the motion, as usual, echoed the Speech.

The Earl of BECTIVE moved, that an hum-  
ble address be presented to his Excellency the  
Lord Lieutenant to thank him for his speech  
from the throne.

The motion was agreed to, and a  
committee appointed to prepare the same.

The LORD CHANCELLOR presented, he said,  
by order of the Lord Lieutenant, translated  
copies of the Declaration and Counter-Decla-  
ration, and the Convention entered into with  
Spain.

The titles being read, they were ordered to  
lie on the table.

After which the house adjourned to next  
day.

## HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Thursday, Jan. 20

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's speech,  
(the Lords) was read from the chair, and be-  
ing afterwards read at the table by the clerk.

Mr. J. WOLFE, moved the Address, which,  
as usual, is the echo of the speech.

Mr. VANDREURE, in very few words, se-  
tiated the motion for the Address.

After the Address had been read from the  
chair,

Mr. GRATTAN rose to give only his dissent  
to the address expressive of their approbation

powerful influence to recommend to the Legislature and promote such measures as

To which his Excellency returned the fol-  
lowing Answer:

" I entirely concur with you in opinion that  
the most mischievous consequence ariseth to the  
health and morals of the people from the im-  
moderate use of spirituous liquors, and I shall  
be happy to co-operate in such measures as  
shall be found expedient to remedy this evil."

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has been  
pleased to appoint Arthur O'Connor, of Mount  
Arthur, Esq. to be High Sheriff of the county  
of Cork, for the present year.—And,

William Spaight, Esq. of Corbally, to be  
High Sheriff of the co. Clare.

WHEREAS the certificate of an indictment  
found by the Grand Jury of the County  
of Limerick, at an Assizes held at St. Francis'-  
Abbey, in and for the county of Limerick, the  
31st day of July, 1790, before the Honourable  
William Heno, Esq; second Justice, and the  
Honourable Sir Samuel Bradstreet, Bart. third  
Justice of his Majesty's court of King's Bench in  
Ireland, hath been laid before us, by which it  
appears that William Lane of Manisternena in  
the said County of Limerick, Gent. stands in-  
dicted for feloniously assaulting and committing  
a Rape on Lucinda Clancy, Spinster, of the  
Age of Thirteen Years, the only Daughter and  
Heiress of John Clancy, late of Ballygiletag-  
hill in the said County, Gent. deceased, on the  
13th Day of April last past.

NOW we, the Lord Lieutenant and Council,  
having a just Abhorrence of such criminal and  
felonious Proceeding, do, by this our Procla-  
mation, publish and declare, that if any Person  
or Persons shall, on or before the Tenth Day
