A ministerial paper of Friday last, gives the following as an extract of a letter from Windsor, of Jan. 17: "His Majesty's health is materially improved, he is gaining daily; and it is with great pleasure that we can announce, that after dinner, this afternoon, his Majesty, attended by Drs. Baillie, Tieberden, and Willis, walked for more than half an hour on the north side of the terrace, during the greater part of which time his Majesty was in conversation with those gentlemen. His Majesty felt much refreshed by the air; and upon the whole derived much benefit from the walk. In addition to this important change, we understand that his Majesty within these three or four days, has experienced some faint glimmerings of returning sight, so that he could perceive some glasses with drink which were given into his hands. The King's approach to a state of convalescence is slow, but most confident hopes are entertained that it will be sure. The Princess Sophia has been very much indisposed for these three days past, with a violent attack of the spasms, which has confined her Royal Highness to her apartments. The Princess Mary is nearly recovered, but has not ventured out yet, on account of the variable state of the weather."

REGENCY.

The proceedings in the House of Commons on Thursday the 17th inst. upon the Regency Bill will be found in the preceding page. The debates on Friday not being of much importance, we are induced to postpone, relative to the appointment of a council to assist the Queen in the discharge of the trust reposed in her by the state of the realm. The principal difference that arose between Ministers and the Opposition upon this subject did not regard the persons to be appointed, but the mode of appointing them. The Chancellor of the Exchequer insisted upon having the specific names of the parties inserted in the bill, so as to prevent any changes in the administration by the Regent from affecting her Majesty's council. Mr. Sheridan, on the contrary, with the concurrence of the chiefs of his party, wished to have them named from their office, and proposed an amendment to that effect, which was negatived without a division.

Lord John Thynne, after having observed that the names of none of the Royal Family appeared amongst the members of the Queen's council, moved, That his Royal Highness the Duke of York should be added thereto: which being opposed by Mr. Ryder, was also negatived without a division.
