THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.

SATURDAY, JANUARY 25.

Since the violent storm of Monday and Tuesday morning, the weather is cold and boisterous, with occasional rain and hail showers, preceded or followed by squalls of wind. A great part of the country at both sides of the Shannon, is flooded by the high tides, and within a circuit of three or four miles round this city, there are some hundred acres under water, the fields in all the agitation of a river. The inundation has been most injurious to the farmers, whose loss is considerable.

Monday night, a boat from Kildysart, laden with corn, was swamped in the storm and high tide. when four men named M'Mahon, Beaty, Behane and Kinane, were drowned; the boat was found on Wednesday and the body of Behane in her,

The *Garryowen* has proved herself an excellent sea boat on the Shannon at all seasons of the year, and in every change of weather.
