From what I could observe of the impression made on the Court, I would be disposed to say the reserved point will be declared untenable. Throughout the United Kingdom petitions are pre-paring to be sent to Parliament, and a few are already presented, praying an address to the Sovereign for mitigation of punishment, which if followed up with prudence may be successful, at a time like that approaching, and with the recommendation of the Jury before us. There are a few firebrands about the country exciting the people to outrage at this time fellows who would from their character and conduct through life, disgrace the gallows! If the ravings of these scoundrels, and they are of the most flagitious description, be suffered to weigh with the Government, I tremble for the tate of the wretched men.

"The long contested privilege question appears to me to have been brought to a close in the shape of a drawn battle, by the decision of the Queen's Bench on Monday, where Sir William Gossett appeared with Sheriffs Evans and Wheelton in his custody, and returning to the writ of Habeas Corpus the Speaker's warrant that the parties were in arrest for a breach of the privileges of the Commons, which Lord Denman, while maintaining the legality of the former decision of his Court, admitted to be sufficient, and the Sheriffs were born off in secret triumph in custody to their former place of incarceration. This, it would seem, brings the matter to a close, unless some new feature should arise in the case. Howard, the Solici-tor, who brought the former action for Stockdale and who was also in custody, examined and lectured, on the plea that he had apologised, having since his discharge issued another writ against Messrs. A young lad was charged by two watchmen of St.

Michael's, with rescuing a girl who was in their custody for annoying the streets, and striking them. Defendant being asked what he had to say, very deliberately replied, "I have nothing to say; I was drunk." The Mayor inquired if he were not ashamed of his conduct? On the suggestion of some persons near the Bench, he made an apology, and expressed his regret at the circumstance. The Mayor said, that in consequence of having been in jail since Tuesday, he would for the present offence only be fined a shilling, and costs; but he wished him to understand

that the leniency in this case would induce them to act more severely, if again brought before them.

appear to be in liquor.

One of the watchmen deposed that he got Mr. Scully in charge from a gentleman in the street, whose name he did not know, but who said he would go to the watch-house and prefer his charge against him; Cassidy shoved witness in the street, and said the watchmen were a robbing set of fellows who would

sell the town for a glass of whiskey. The Bench condemned the use of such language
