TRIPLE TRAGEDY IN CONNEMARA.

Family Suffocated.

A tragic affair is reported from Connemara. A

OPENING CATTLE SALE.

The Agricultural Hall, Limerick.

On Saturday last Messrs Ebrill Bros., Auctioneers,
 held their opening sale of dairy cattle for this
 season. There was a very good entry, but owing
 to the unfavourable weather some of the
 lots were late for the sale. The heavy
 fall of snow has interfered with all business,
 so the results cannot be looked upon
 as a fair indication of current prices. There is
 every prospect that if the weather improves there
 will be a sharp advance, as there is no doubt but
 the demand is good. Good in-calf heifers made
 from £14 to £13; small do. from £12 to £11;
 dairy cows, springing, are in request, but trade is
 slow in backward cattle, prices from £14 to £12;
 calves prove a dragging trade as anticipated,
 prices £4 to £3.

DEATH OF MISS M. DUGGAN.

DEATH OF A CRIMEAN VETERAN.

The 1st Battalion Black Watch (Royal High-
 landers), with band and firing party, paid full
 military honours yesterday to Louis O'Farrell who
 served with the Essex Regiment, the old 56th in
 the Crimea; and who was the possessor of several
 medals for active service in the field and good con-
 duct during his long service. The deceased had
 attained his 80th year, and retired from the army
 on pension a long time back. He had three medals
 for the Crimea, the Turkish medal, the medal for
 long service, and the medal for good conduct, in
 addition to five badges. The deceased was borne
 from St. Michael's R.C. Church to Mt St. Lawrence
 Cemetery with full military honours, a farewell
 volley being fired over the grave after the inter-
 ment.
