NCIL AT BUCKINGHAM PALACE.

The King held a Council at Buckingham Palace this morning, and approved and signed the Speech to be made to the Throne with which he will open Parliament on Monday. The new members of the House of Commons who figured in the New Year honours, were sworn in. Mr. Fisher, Minister of Lands in the Colonies, was in attendance, and was declared a member of the Council. Viscount Morley, the President, and a few other members attended the Council.

NORTH-EASTERN RAILWAY DISPUTE.

A mass meeting of railwaymen of the North-eastern system will be held at Newcastle on Monday night to consider the whole situation. In reference to the dispute there is a feeling among the upper grade of railwaymen that proper notice should be given if it is decided at tomorrow's meeting to strike. A further feeling is expressed that the Hull men have been too precipitate in their action, and should have referred the matter to the Conciliation Board to be convened immediately.

The situation grew more serious as the morning advanced, and the Company were compelled to cancel all local residential expresses and several other services. They feel confident, however, that they will be able to maintain the ordinary service throughout the day. More men are ceasing work every day. The goods department is practically at a stand-still.

In reply to the manager's telegram a deputation of the men left Hull for York at noon. The station is unauthorised to accept terms.
