21 TO THE EDITOR OF The Limerick Chronicle.

SIR—I have within the last half-hour seen your CHRONICLE of Saturday last, from which I learn that a case against one of my apprentices for absence, came before the Petty Sessions Court of the preceding day. It appears the magistrates presiding deprecated the "rigid system" adopted in my Factory, and that I am to be remonstrated with for the harshness of my proceedings on my return home. I beg to say I shall take the very earliest opportunity of attending the Petty Sessions after my return, and will endeavour respectfully to show the bench—without denying the fact of long hours—that such remarks were uncalled for by any conduct of mine, or any rule of my factory, and not justifiable in my absence, and in ignorance of the real facts of the case. But, I regret to say, this is not the first time such observations have been levelled against me by Magistrates of that court, and with as little foundation in truth. I have long had reason to regret that I ever was induced to open an establishment in Limerick, and the sort of treatment I have experienced for some years past from some members of the Petty Sessions Court, has greatly increased that regret.

That the law is stretched on what is deemed the popular side, is, I believe, universally admitted; and as regards myself, I have been denied that which in half an hour has been granted to another, under precisely the same circumstances.

I am happy to bear testimony that there are Magistrates of that court who think an individual giving employment to 400 poor females is not altogether without the pale of the law, nor undeserving their support; but there are others, and those the most regular in their attendance—who, to use the words of the late Mr. Charles Walker, to whom Limerick is so deeply indebted, "have great consideration and much sympathy for the poor employed, but none for the poor employer."
