 ken our feelings and candidly on the merits of the Elec-

 tunes that could befall a state—than ourselves; and we
 know of no good man, attached to any party or sect, that
 did not cordially echo a similar sentiment. Happily
 we did not come to that issue, and a reference to our pre-
 vious statement will fully establish the fact. We take
 pleasure in our contemporary in the same amicable spirit in
 which he was pleased to allude to us.

A man named William Ryan, charged with the murder
 of Mr. Sadler, in the neighbourhood of Dunlavin, some
 time since, was arrested yesterday by a party of Police,
 Kilmastulla.

A young man, named Hart, fell into the Canal at
 Salmon Harbour, on Friday, and was drowned.

Mr. John Scaughnessy, agent to Lord French, fell
 from his horse, returning from the fair of Castleblakeny,
 Thursday, and was killed.

Mr. J. Savage, a Dublin Auctioneer, expired on
 Sunday, in Tullow, County Carlow, in consequence of
 an affection by sulphurous gas from a stove fire in a close
 room, in which he had reposed for a night. Such
 afflictions have given repeated, and salutary warnings,
 still—such is the general insensibility—without per-
 ceivable effect.

Daniel McGrath, a countryman, from Cappamore, was
 carried into the County Infirmary, yesterday, with frac-
 tured skull, from the blow of a spade.

The old town is infested with pickpockets of both sexes,
 many of those wretches frequently create an imaginary
 disturbance, for the purpose of collecting a crowd, and
 ordering with more success.

On Thursday, the Right Worshipful Henry Rose,
 Mayor, visited the House of Industry, and made
 the following Report—"I visited this day the House of
 Industry and Hospital for Lunatics, &c. in the absence,
 of an illness, of the valuable Treasurer to the Charity.
 The establishment is at this time of distress of the greatest
 magnitude, and the only advantage to the poor of the City, and its inmates
 at present greater than at any former period, while
 hundreds are asking for admission, which the extent and
 funds of the Charity cannot afford them. The whole
 establishment is conducted with the greatest economy,
 regularity and order." His Worship left Two Pounds
 for the support of the Institution.

The Cork House of Industry has now within its walls
 three hundred and twenty-eight paupers, and pressing
 necessities are made by hundreds more distressed and un-
 employed persons for admission, and relief. The House
 is inconveniently full, and the most appalling misery
 exists among the middling and humbler classes in that
 city. When the Board was sitting on Tuesday, a mul-
 titude of half-starving creatures surrounded the
 doors, and endeavoured to burst them in. From the re-
 presentations of these unfortunate people, a few of whom
 were admitted, before the Mayor and the Board, it ap-
 peared that 200 carpenters, 300 cotton weavers, 60 smiths,
 50 cooperers, and 50 nailers, are unemployed. The
 Mayor has called a general meeting of the citizens for
 Friday. The funds of the House of Industry are totally
 exhausted.

On Tuesday, as the large assemblage of persons were
 returning from the House of Industry, Cork, after
 presenting the petition to the Mayor and the Governors
 of that Institution—a disposition to riot was manifested
 by some of the party, and one, in particular, rushed
 into a baker's shop, but was immediately taken into
 custody by the City Sheriffs, and committed to Bridewell.
 The following appears in the Carlow paper—"The
 advertiser is a respectable Young Man, of middle stature
 and pleasing appearance, affable manners, amiable temper,
 and just arrived at age—he is a native of Armagh, but
 has been resident for some time past in this Town.—
 Being about to commence business, is desirous of
 forming a Matrimonial Alliance with a Young Woman
 of respectable, who is not deemed ordinary and pos-
 sessing a reasonable portion."

 mence running on Thursday next.
 The Mayor has fined a butcher in the new market
