FRENCH FLEET OFF CORK.

Limerick Gazette Office, 3 o'Clock.

We have just learned from unquestionable authority, that a French Fleet has been discovered off Cork. This intelligence has been conveyed by an express from Cork, to General Montresor, commanding this district. At this late hour, we have not time for further particulars—if the above is correct, we hope shortly to have the pleasure to congratulate our country, on their meeting the usual fate of every hostile fleet that has hitherto presumed to menace the Heaven-defended shores of Erin.

This morning about 3 o'clock it blew a violent storm from the N. W. which did considerable damage to the vessels in this river. The Rockingham, of Portsmouth, lying at Torrance's-Quay, was thrown on her beam end, and suffered considerably—several boats were sunk—a large vessel lying, at Grass Island, was driven on shore, and we hear several persons were lost.—The tide rose to a height unknown these many years past.—A Black Man belonging to the Shannon, of Workington, was drowned.—In the Irish town the old Diocesan School was blown down.

The English Lord Chancellor, on a motion for time a few days ago, in the court of Chancery, granted three months; on which the counsel observed, that at the expiration of that period the party must apply again; to which his Lordship answered, "Then he must apply to my successor, for it is not probable that I shall then be sitting here."

The Jalouse Jeop of war, Captain Morris, has the signal flying at Cove, for convoy to Lisbon, to which port she will proceed with the transports now receiving artillery horses on board for the British army in Portugal, the first favourable weather after their embarkation.

The damages sustained by the boat, freighted with corn, on the approach of the Venus of Yarmouth to the port of Clare, as mentioned in a former paper, has been determined, by the arbitration of two mercantile gentlemen in this city, to whom it was referred, to be made good by the owner or commander of the Venus.

Major General John Croker is appointed to the staff in the West India.

Wednesday, Mr. Lancaster delivered a lecture in Tralee, on his Plan of Education, explanatory of its economy of time, labour, and expence, at the Assembly Room—and we understand that the Hon. Judge Day has given the munificent donation of £50, towards the establishment of the Lancasterian System of Education in that Town.

On Monday, William Power, a workman employed in a store in Waterford, unfortunately stepped into the aperture of the upper lofts, through which the goods are hoisted and lowered—he fell through two lofts, and was dreadfully bruised in the descent. The first surgical aid was immediately procured, but to no avail, as he expired the following morning.

The following account of a most sanguinary duel affords a sad picture of American morals:—

Extract of a letter from an officer in the navy, dated Norfolk, December 28.

"A most horrid circumstance took place here last evening. Young Mercer, whom you have often heard me mention, had received an insult from the mate of some merchantman—a challenge followed, and last evening about sun down they met within a mile of the town—their distance of fighting was only sufficient for them not to touch the body with each other pistols the word was given—both fired, and both fell dead.—The whole town is in an uproar.—The seconds have taken safety by flight; their bodies were brought to town last evening and will this day be interred."
