the granting any time to plead which the counsel for the defendant might imagine necessary for his defence. The plaintiffs were extremely anxious for a trial, because the actions afforded the first fair opportunity that had yet occurred, in Ireland, of meeting the question on the convention act openly, and of having the opinions of the judges in this country, and of the House of Lords, on the subject—but anxious as the plaintiffs were, for a speedy decision, they were still more desirous to give the defendant every accommodation in point of time and arrangement—and that the cause should be conducted, on their part, in a manner suited to the dignity and importance of the great national question which it involved. It did appear to him that the plea of the general would allow the defendant to go into all the circumstances of his case—if, however, the counsel for the defendant conceived that plea not sufficient, under the statute, the plaintiffs were ready, and he, as their counsel, offered to enter into a consent rule to permit the entire defence to be given in evidence upon that plea, and he, therefore, called on the learned defendant to meet the question at once openly and candidly. This offer not being accepted—

The Chief Baron said, that he thought the defendant was ill-advised in his line of defence. I enter my protest said he, against the precedent of being sued in any court but my own; and I do not understand why a short plea of the general issue would not be sufficient to let in the defence; however, there being no actual opposition, let the motion be granted.

Baron McClelland said, that in an action brought against the very same judge, on a former occasion in that court, the late Lord Chief Baron had desired the counsel, who applied for time to plead, to take ten years.

Mr. O'Connell suggested to the court, that there was an obvious distinction between the two cases. The former was an action brought against the present defendant for an act done in his judicial capacity as a judge; the present were actions brought against him in his ministerial capacity, as a justice of peace. The law requires that the judges should be responsible to Parliament alone—but private justices of the peace had not that privilege. The plaintiffs would give up their actions, if the defendant's attorney would swear that he was instructed to defend the learned defendant as for an act done by him as a judge.

It appears, therefore, that (however anxious the plaintiffs may be for a final decision) they are not likely to obtain a trial at bar, in those most interesting cases sooner than the middle of November.

By the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland. A PROCLAMATION.—RICHMOND, &c.

WHEREAS it appears to us by information upon oath, that about the hour of 3 o'clock on the morning of Saturday 18th Jan. last, a private soldier in his Majesty's Limerick City regt. of militia, was fired at while on his post at the Naval Hospital, Mecklenburgh-street, Dublin, by some evil-minded person at present unknown, and was immediately afterwards knocked down with a large stone by some persons also unknown.

Now we the Lord Lieutenant and Council of Ireland, being determined as far as in us lies to bring to speedy and condign punishment the person or persons who fired at; and who afterwards struck the said Michael Tierney as aforesaid, do hereby publish and declare, that if any person or persons shall within six calendar months from the date hereof, discover the persons who fired the said shot and struck the said Michael Tierney, or either of them, so as that they or either of them be apprehended and convicted thereof, such person or persons so discovering shall receive as a reward the sum of £100.

And we do hereby publish and declare, that if any person or persons (other than the persons who committed the said offences) who may have been privy to, or concerned in firing at or striking the said M. Tierney, shall within the time aforesaid, discover his or their accomplice or accomplices, so that he or they be convicted thereof, such person so discovering, shall not only receive the said reward, but shall also receive his Majesty's most gracious and free pardon for the same.

And we do hereby strictly charge and command all Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Sheriffs, Bailiffs, and all other his Majesty's loving subjects, to use their utmost endeavours to bring the said offender or offenders, and every of them to speedy and condign punishment.
