 Mr. George Miller, only son of Captain William Miller,
 Royal Navy—In Ceylon, on the 17th of August last, Mrs.
 Vallance; and on the following day, her husband, Major
 Vallance, 73d Regiment—At Sidmouth, the widow of the
 Right Hon. John Armstrong; she married secondly the Rev.
 Jas. Hobson, of Dublin, who was tutor in her son's family—
 At Penzance, in Cornwall, Harriet Frances, daughter of
 Lady Frances Viner—In Edinburgh, Gideon Duncan, Esq.
 Commissary-General—Thomas Knight, Esq. one of the
 Managers of the Liverpool and Manchester Theatres—Miss
 O'Beirne, daughter of the late William O'Beirne, of Sligo,
 Esq.—At his seat, Knockanra, Co. Clare, on Tuesday, in his
 73d year, D. Mulvihill, Esq. As a husband, he was affec-
 tionate and gentle; as a parent, loving and gratifying; as a
 landlord, indulgent and protective; and as a companion and
 friend, admired for his cheerfulness and sincerity—In Ennis,
