## HOUSE of COMMONS.

SATURDAY, Feb. 14.

As soon as the Speaker had taken the chair, the order of the day, which stood for taking into consideration his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's speech, was called for, and on its being read by the Clerk,

The ATTORNEY GENERAL observed, that as he did not see certain gentlemen, who were supposed to be intended to constitute a part of a new Administration, then in the House, he should move that the order of the day be postponed to Tuesday next, which being agreed to, it was then moved that the House do adjourn to the same day, and on the question being put, it was unanimously agreed to. House adjourned to Tuesday.

Monday in the House of Lords the Duke of Leinster moved, "that the House do agree with the Commons, in their address to the Prince of Wales," which was opposed by Lord Mountmorris, who moved to adjourn for 14 days.— Lord Perry overturned every argument against the address, by this plain argument "It has always been received by law, and expressly mentioned by my Lord Coke, and other writers, —that Ireland is not to be construed to be included in any British act, unless expressly mentioned—and no act says that the Regent of Great Britain shall be Regent of Ireland."—The House divided—for the Duke of Leinster's motion, Contents 40, Proxies 5.—Non-contents 20 Proxies 6.—Majority for the Address 19.

As soon as the Address to the Prince of Wales, humbly intreating his Royal Highness to accept of the Regency of this kingdom, comes down from the House of Lords to the Commons, on Tuesday next, and that it shall be ordered, that such Members of the House as are of the Privy Council do wait on his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, in order to have the Address certified and transmitted to his Royal Highness, both Houses will then adjourn for about a week, in order to wait for an answer from the Prince.

Extract of a Letter from Gibraltar, Jan. 2  
"The Officers of this garrison have the mortification to feel, and beg leave, through your paper, to declare, that, owing to the declared enmity of the Emperor of Morocco, and the implacable resentment of the Court of Madrid against this garrison, the communication with Spain has not been opened since the conclusion of the war; and all intercourse with Barbary has ceased for ten months past. These circumstances have deprived us of all supplies from these parts, and occasioned a scarcity, amounting to almost a total want of fresh provisions, to the very great distress of every individual in this garrison. The private soldiers have not tasted fresh meat for more than ten months past, and the dreadful effects of the scurvy, are, with too much cause, expected and apprehended.

"From the above account, you must instantly perceive the great injury we sustain by the paragraphs in newspapers, falsely publishing, that the garrison enjoys an abundance of fresh provisions; as the insertion of such paragraphs deceives the public, and the friends of all officers here, who are hereby prevented sending out any supplies hither, either from England or Ireland.
