Morgan Behane, one of the survivors of the wreck of the late Francis Spaight, of and for this port from N. America, walked into a shop at Arthur's-quay, on Wednesday evening, and sat upon a form, resting his head upon the table close by. The poor fellow was a corpse in less than five minutes! His health had been greatly impaired by the sufferings endured upon the wreck, and his emaciated appearance bore painful testimony of scenes from which the mind recoils with horror.

The body of a mariner was taken out of the river yesterday evening below the Pool, and brought up to the quays. A watch was found in his pocket. He is supposed to have been the sailor who fell overboard a vessel in the Pool, about three weeks ago, and was drowned.

Saturday evening last, a poor man returning from the market of Newcastle, in this County, after selling a pig, accompanied by his daughter a young woman, was met about half-way between that town and Abbeyfeale, by five or six fellows who knocked him down and robbed him of the price of the pig; then dragged his daughter into the fields, and kept her until next morning under the grossest ill usage!

A young man named James Mulvihill, died suddenly at Carrigaholt, county Clare, on Saturday. He had been married on the previous day, and was enjoying himself among his friends and acquaintances, playing for them on the Highland pipes, when suddenly complaining of fatigue, he went and lay down on his bed, where he expired in a few minutes after.

Michael Moore, a butcher, residing in Newcastle, returning home from the last fair of Rathkeale, rather intoxicated, was put into a car, when his leg got out between the spokes of the wheel, where it was desperately shattered, and in spite of Medical skill and attendance, a mortification set in. He died on Thursday last of the injury, leaving a large and distressed family to deplore his loss.
