Yesterday, a soldier of the 66th Regiment, on his
 way to this City, from Patrick's-well, was attacked by
 two men, with pistols, near Barnakille-bridge, who had
 jumped over a hedge and demanded what money he had—
 one of them presented a pistol at his head, and the soldier
 having put up his arm, was shot through the hand. The
 fellows then took some cotton and other small articles
 from him, and ran off.

On Sunday night, a party of incendiaries set fire to the
 Barn and Store-House of James Hewson, Esq. of Tom-
 deely, near Askeaton, which was totally consumed. The
 police from Askeaton soon arrived, but were unable to
 discover the authors or check the devouring flame.

On the same night, a man, named M'Auliffe, return-
 ing from Askeaton after attending the funeral of one
 Richard Nash, drank so freely of ardent spirits that he
 was found dead in the morning. An inquest was held
 by John Cox, Esq. Coroner, and a verdict had that the
 deceased died from intoxication.

On Thursday night, a gang of robbers forced an entrance
 into the Barn of an industrious farmer, named Mulcahy,
 at Riddlestown, in this County, and carried off a great
 quantity of corn prepared for market.

On Thursday last, an inquest was held by John Cox,
 Esq. on the body of Thomas Hannan, Clerk to the Priest
 of Cappa. Verdict, that he died by a fall from his
 horse.

Monday night, the shop of Miss Cuddy, in the town of
 Tipperary, was robbed of silks and other articles, to the
 amount of 60L

As the Cork early Coach was leaving town yesterday
 morning for its destination, the leaders on approaching
 the turnpike took fright at some object on the road, and
 became exceedingly restive. In the confusion which
 ensued the poll of the coach snapped in two, and then the
 animals became quite unmanageable; one of the wheel
 horses was forced by the leaders against the sharp point
 of the splinter bar, which entered his flanks, and inflicted
 a deep cut, his struggles only rendering the wound more
 fatal. The animal was soon relieved from pain, a
 fresh horse and vehicle were procured, and the coach
 proceeded without any further obstacle.

On the night of the 21st instant, at the hour of eleven
 o'clock, two houses were completely consumed to ashes in
 the town of Athy, and the families by whom they were
 inhabited narrowly escaped with their lives. An investi-
 gation was held by the Magistrates on the ensuing morn-
 ing, when it clearly appeared to have been committed
 maliciously, and warrants were immediately granted for
 the apprehension of two men, named Farrell, (father and
 son.); and as the police under Captain Doolan were most
 active and unremitting in their exertions, we are happy to
 state that those persons have been arrested, and are now in
 custody.
