LIMERICK SPRING ASSIZES.

The commission for the holding of the Limerick Spring Assizes will be opened on the Friday of the ensuing week, the 4th March prox., Lord Chief Justice O'Brien presiding in the City Court, and Mr. Justice Dodd in the County Crown Court. So far there are no criminal cases from the city for trial, and with the exception of the Rathkeale wife murder case those from the county are few. The charges in the criminal cases for trial from the county are:—Thomas Gammell, murder; John Donoghue, personation at Ballylanders, at a Parliamentary election; James Hunt, Henry Baker, and John Sheehy, assault on Patrick Hallinan at Newcastle; Laurence Curtin, and Michael Lynch, rape. There are six petitions from the County Council to the Judge in respect of the making of six new roads in the Barony of Glenquin, under the provisions of the Local Government Act. The Earl of Devon is raising a question as to valuation with respect to three of the roads in question. There are 47 appeals listed for hearing.
