

such an answer to the two Houses of Parliament; he therefore moved,

"That his Excellency the Marquis of Buckingham, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, in refusing to transmit an address of both Houses, was disrespectful to the Prince of Wales, and carried an unwarrantable censure on both Houses of Parliament."

Lord Hillsborough thought the whole of the resolutions should be considered together by the House. He then requested the question might be read, and moved as an amendment that these words be inserted in addition:

"Such Address having been voted before his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales had any authority by law so do what is required in that Address."

After much debate the question was put on the amendment, when there appeared,—Not-Contents 31—Contents, proxies included, 30—Majority against the amendment 8.

The House then adjourned till FRIDAY.

The Levee at the Castle yesterday was more thinly attended than we ever recollect to have seen during the administration of any former Viceroy.

The deputation appointed by the Lords and Commons, to present the Address to the Prince of Wales, failed last Sunday morning in the Duchess of Rutland Packet, for Holyhead.—The Duchess of Rutland was the only vessel which failed on Sunday.

The packet which should have failed on Saturday night, was detained here by order of his Excellency, for a particular purpose. It is somewhat extraordinary, that the Lord Lieutenant should stop the sailing of the packets for his own private accommodation.

The Lord Mayor fined a countryman yesterday five pounds for selling barley by false samples, which together with 4l. more a fine for selling wheat in like manner, he gave to the Church-wardens of St. Nicholas-without, for the poor of said parish.

Sunday last a charity sermon was preached in St. Peter's Church, by the Rev. Walter Blake Kirwan, and a collection made for the charity-school of said parish, amounting to 286l. 10s.
