KENNEDY V. KELLY.

An action for slander was tried on Monday last in the Court of King's Bench before the Right Hon. the Lord Chief Justice Downes and a Special Jury; wherein the plaintiff, who is an attorney, brought an action for letters which had been written containing some foul aspersions, which he conceived to militate against his character; the trial lasted almost the whole of the day, after which the Jury pronounced a verdict for the defendant with six-pence costs.

Thursday last an action came to be tried in the Common Pleas before Lord Norbury, in which H. Williams, of Anglesea-street, in this city, merchant, was plaintiff, and P. J. T. Pearce was defendant. The action was brought against Pearce for making a forcible entry into Williams's dwelling. house, and possessing himself of his property. It appeared Pearce was messenger and provisional assignee under a Commission of Bankruptcy issued in London—and after a full investigation of the matter by a trial which lasted two days; the Jury brought in a verdict for plaintiff of 3001. damages.
