Friday evening last, a melancholy accident occurred in Leith Walk, by the starting of a spirited horse, which was yoked in a cart, and with which he ran off with such rapidity, that the nails which join the body of the cart to the axle, jumped out and left the wheels; and one of the shafts struck Anthony Kerr, a servant of Mr. Learmouth, with such violence, that he died a very short time after he was conveyed to his own house. It appears that if these nails, named cannon nails, had been fixed in a manner similar to lynch-pins in carriage wheels, this accident could not have happened; and this circumstance is certainly worth attention, that similar accidents may be in future prevented.

Thursday last afternoon, an old woman, in the village of the Wather of Leith, about 70 years of age, was sitting at her fire-side, when, falling asleep, her clothes caught fire, and she was so much burned that she expired before nine o'clock at night.

On Thursday, during the time of worship in the forenoon, an elderly woman, at Main Point, Portsburgh, put a period to her life, by hanging herself. We have heard of no cause for her committing this rash act.
