

non, preferred by Mr. P. Kelly, Inspector of Fisheries, against James Liddy. Mr. Kelly deposed that he saw him net-fishing on the South side of the Shannon, on Mr. Powell's waters, on the night of the 20th February.—The defendant was not a qualified fisherman as required by law, nor had he the permission of the proprietor to fish thereon. Mr. Kelly swore to these facts, and referred to a compilation of the Fishery Laws in support of his evidence—he grounded his charge chiefly on the 17th and 18th Geo. 3d. Mr. Kelly was cross-examined by Mr. Worrall, Attorney for the defendant, but nothing very material was elicited in favor of his client. Evidence was gone into for the defence, but failed in disproving Mr. Kelly's case—and after a tedious investigation to which the Magistrates gave the most patient attention, the Chairman said they were of opinion that a conviction could be had, to which the penalty assigned by law was a fine of £5 or six months imprisonment, the latter they would reduce to two months—they were happy, however, that the decision was open to appeal on the part of the defendant. Giving the necessary security as required by the Act, there were nearly 100 anglers and cot-men present during the inquiry, and most anxiously awaiting its result. The Mayor, in pronouncing the decision, hoped that this conviction would convince them that they were acting illegally.

On Friday, a Pawnbroker was convicted before the Mayor and Sir Christopher Marrett in the penalty of four times the value, of articles, knowingly received from a laundress in pledge, and the articles so pawned were returned to their owners. A woman employed by the laundress to pledge the goods was, in default of the penalty, committed to Jail by the Magistrates.
