### Bishop of Cloyne's Condemnation

The Most Rev Dr Browne, Roman Catholic Bishop of Cloyne, in a letter read at the weekly meeting of the Holy Family Confraterrity last eveing at Queenstown Cathedral, says: - On Saturday a hideous crime was committed near our sowe. In broad daylight the public road leading from our main thoroughfare was reddened with innocent human blood. A small party of soldiers, on their way to their barrack, was, as you are aware, set upon by a gang of desperadoes with the ailly purpose of possessing themselves of their firearms, and in the melee that followed the life of an innocent, unoffending young man was taken. It was a dradful crime against the laws of society and of God. In the name of the order-loving Catholic people of Queenstown, and in my own, I express our abhorrence of the awful crime, and denounce it. Let us hope and pray, brethren, that our condemnation and denunciation may help to open the eyes of those desperate men who are out for crime, to see that by such wicked courses they are rivetting our chains the faster, and laving up against themselves a terrible vergeance on the great accounting day for trampling under foot the law of God."
