ron Pennefather arrived in town yesterday evening from Ennis at six o'clock, escorted by the City High Sheriffs and a detachment of the Queen's Bays.

Colonel O'Grady has been prevented by his Parli- mentary duties serving on the County Grand Jury this Assizes.

At ten o'clock, this day, Mr. Serjeant Blackburn took his seat in the County Court, and proceeded with Civil Bill Appeals. Previously, the Grand Jury were called over on a penalty of £10 each, and several of the absentees fined. Appeal, Halpin v. Welsh, for 7s. 6d. affirmed, without costs; Hayes v. Callaghan, reversed; Meade v. Molony, action on note for £7, affirmed with costs; Burke v. Cox, for £77s. affirmed with costs; Ryan v. Dee, for £8 10s. affirmed with costs; M'Carthy v. Fitzgerald, affirmed with costs; John Blackburn v. Dean and Chapter of St. Mary's. This was an Ejectment by the Dean and Chapter to re- cover the Globe Lands of Ballygaddy East, decree re- versed without costs and prejudice, Dean and Chapter not having a competent witness to prove the demand for possession. Mr. Jackson was retained for the Dean and Chapter—Mr. Cooper for Blackburn.

The Court then entered on Criminal business. Connor Keating, for stealing four sheep from James O'Don- nell, and James Cregan, a Rathkeale butcher, for re- ceiving them with a knowledge of their being stolen, were found guilty, the former to be transported for seven years, the latter to be imprisoned 12 months and kept to hard labour.

Baron Pennefather presides this day in the Record Court, for trial of Nisi Prius cases.

There are but five burning petitions in the County this Assizes, viz H. Allen and E. O'Donnell, P. Rawleigh, W. Sheehan and John Sheehy, and W. Connell.

Sunday the Hon. Baron Pennefather and Mr. Ser- jeant Blackburne attended Divine Service, and received the Sacrament at Ennis Church. The Rev. Michael Fitzgerald and the Rev. Charles Fitzgerald officiated.— The Judges were dressed in their robes and were attended by the High Sheriff, and escorted to and from Church by the Bailiffs in their livery.

At Ennis Assizes Patrick Kinnivan was found guilty of having in his possession the vestment and other Priest's robes stolen from the Chapel of Six-mile Bridge.

On Monday last, Peter Comyn, Esq. of Scotland- Lodge, near Burren, was tried for having maliciously burned his dwelling-house on the 6th of December last. The premises were under ejectment, and coming into possession of Bindon Scott, Esq. when the wicked deed was perpetrated. He was, after a trial of seven hours, before Serjeant Blackburne, convicted by a respectable Jury, on a moment's consideration. The indictment was capitally laid. Mr. Comyn is allied to many respect- able families, and was Magistrate, at a time, for the Counties of Clare, Galway and Mayo.

Seven have been left for execution at Ennis—Nelson, of Feakle, for the brutal assault on the child (whose trial is unfit to meet the public eye;) the three wretches for cutting out the tongues of the poor farmers near Kilrush; Mr. Comyn, for maliciously burning; and two for burglary.

Mr. Comyn is to be hanged on the 14th April; Nel- son on the 10th March; Timothy Magrath, Michael Clone, and Patrick Sullivan, for cutting out the tongues of the Doyles, on the 20th March; and the two Aherns on the 14th April.

In the case of W. Wheeler, assignee of Saunders Young, executor of R. Young, v. Philip Doyne, which was a scire facias to revive a judgment for 2,000l. in 1792, against Michael Furnell, Esq. deceased, and sought to be recovered off the estate of Fortfergus, the Jury found for Defendant, subject to the opinion of the Superior Courts, on the validity of the judgment.

The County Clare Grand Jury have agreed to petition Parliament for a reformation of the Grand Jury laws.

The Chief Baron and Judge Torrens opened the Wicklow Assizes on Monday.

Joseph Deane Freeman, Esq. is to be Foreman of the County Cork Grand Jury.

Thomas Gould, Esq. is appointed first Sergeant at Law. F. Blackburne, Esq. second Sergeant, and J. H. North, Esq. M. P. third Sergeant. Mr. North vacates his seat for Melbourne Port.

Mr Gerard Callaghan has addressed the Cork electors; it is stated that he is now quite eligible to be its repre- sentative, and as to the certainty of his re-election there is no doubt entertained by those whose information on the subject is to be relied on.

DREADFUL HOMICIDE.

Saturday night, Patrick Byrne, a mariner, was as- saulted between the hours of 11 and 12 o'clock in White Wine-street, Irishtown, by three or four men who had been drinking in a public house. One of the party stabbed him in the left side with a dagger, which penetra- ted the third and fourth ribs to the heart. The unfortu- nate man fell under the blow, and never spoke afterwards. Death released him from mortal suffering in a few minutes after being conveyed to the house of his afflicted mother, whose principal, in fact, only support he was. The assassin charged with this horrible act is named Nicholas Hayes, by trade a cutler, who absconded im- mediately after the deadly deed, but was secured at his lodgings in Cornwallis street. The Mayor, Henry Rose, Esq. held an inquisition on the body of deceased next day, when four witnesses were examined, and the jury agreed to a verdict of wilful murder. The dagger is in possession of the authorities.

The greatest praise is due to Gorman, a watch of St. Michael's, for apprehending the persons supposed to be concerned in killing Byrnes.

The windows of Hayes's house in the square who is charged with killing Byrnes the sailor, in the streets on Saturday night, were broken on Monday evening by some of the populace attending his funeral.

In the noon day of Monday, Mr. John Leamy, of Dungarvan, after getting possession of lands in the County Waterford, was met by two men in female at- tire on his road home. One of them discharged a blunderbuss at him, and three balls entered his back.— He fell from his horse, and was conveyed into Dun- garvan, where he now lies in a hopeless state.

On Saturday evening last, a child was saved from drowning at Thomond-gate, by the intrepid exertions of P. Mullins, hair-dresser, of this City, who, at the ut- most hazard and risk of his life, succeeded in her pre- servation.

Saturday night the residence of Mr. Daniel Mulvihill, at Darragh, County Clare, was consumed by an acci- dental fire. The house and furniture were insured with the Protector Company. The greater part of the furni- ture was preserved, as were also some of the house timber.
