HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Saturday, March 5. The house was called ever, in order to ballot for a felect committee to try and determine the merits of the perition of John Bagwell, Efq. alfo the perition of feveral fresholders, complaining of an undue election and return for the county Tipperary, when the following members were chosen the committee :- Robert Langrishe, John Wolfe of Newland, Richard Maginnis, Efqrs. Hon. William Cuffe, George Knox, Efq; Hon. Hugh Howard, Sir John Freke, Bart. John Staples, Ewdard Hoare, Richard Grace, Francis Hardy Efgrs. Hon. Nathaniel Clements, William Parkinfon Ruxton, Arthur French, Efgrs. and Colonel E. Coote, who were fworn at thetable, and ordered to meet forthwith.

A message from the Lords, by the Lord Chief Baron and Mr. Justice Bennett, that the Lords had agreed, without any amendment, to the bill for regulating and extending the tobacco, fugar, and coffee trade; and aifo to the French commercial treaty bill, which were ordered to the Lord Lieurenant for transmission.
