#### Parliament of Ireland.

##### HOUSE OF COMMONS.

Saturday, March 5.

The house was called over, in order to bal-  
 lot for a select committee to try and determine  
 the merits of the petition of John Bagwell, Esq.  
 also the petition of several freeholders, com-  
 plaining of an undue election and return for  
 the county Tipperary, when the following  
 members were chosen the committee:—Robert  
 Langrishe, John Wolfe of Newland, Richard  
 Maginnis, Esqrs. Hon. William Cuffe, George  
 Knox, Esq; Hon. Hugh Howard, Sir John  
 Freke, Barr. John Staples, Edward Hoare,  
 Richard Grace, Francis Hardy Esqrs. Hon.  
 Nathaniel Clements, William Parkinson Rux-  
 ton, Arthur French, Esqrs. and Colonel E.  
 Coote, who were sworn at the table, and order-  
 ed to meet forthwith.

A message from the Lords, by the Lord Chief  
 Baron and Mr. Justice Bennett, that the Lords  
 had agreed, without any amendment, to the  
 bill for regulating and extending the tobacco,  
 sugar, and coffee trade; and also to the French  
 commercial treaty bill, which were ordered to  
 the Lord Lieutenant for transmission.

Another message from the Lords by two of  
 the Masters in Chancery, that the Lords had  
 agreed without any amendment, to the track-
