guard against licentious liberty of the Press, which, of all  
other evils, was perhaps the greatest and the most destructive  
to the peace of the country, although there was nothing  
more calculated to secure to it the greatest benefits and  
advantage than a public press, if guided by loyal and  
virtuous principles. He felt happy that in the calendar of  
the County of Limerick he did not find any proofs of the dis-  
affection of principle or magnitude of crimes which were  
unfortunately too visible in other parts of the Kingdom;  
but, he felt it his duty to tell the gentlemen of the Grand  
Jury that, though their County was undisturbed by factious  
disposition or rebellious feelings, yet they should not relax  
in their endeavours to prevent its approach, when they found  
other parts suffering under its effects—it is not, said his  
Lordship, when your houses are on fire, that you should play  
the engine on it, but you should meet the danger, if possible.  
You are called on by the duty you owe to yourselves and to  
your County, to resist nightly assemblies, and to admonish  
your tenantry against joining in them; these will be your  
duties—and if you perform them faithfully, as I am sure  
you are disposed to do, you will have no occasion to resort  
to the laws in force for their punishment and suppression, and  
you will thereby save the County from the heavy expences  
attendant on their introduction; by such an exertion on the  
parts of the resident Gentry, they will put a stop to those  
shameful violations of good order and discipline and they  
will restore the County to a state of peace and tranquility.

presence of many persons, and which were prejudicial to  
Plaintiff's character—Verdict for Plaintiff, £300 damages  
and 6d. costs.

Leahy, v. Haskins, of Newcastle—Action of Trover—  
The Plaintiff's cattle were seized and sold for an Arrears

tenant. The Plaintiff having only taken the grazing from a
