

A claim has been lodged on behalf of Mr. Stephen O'Halloran, Sixmile Bridge, for £12 compensation for the killing of a bullock on lands which he holds under Lord Inchiquin at Derrypark, Lemencagh, in the Burren district. The animal was found dead on Tuesday by the herd, and on examination was found to be shot through the breast, the bullet penetrating to the lungs. There have been several drives on Mr. O'Halloran's lands, and he has been the recipient of compensation in the County Court. A heifer belonging to Mr. Thomas Crowe, D.L., was also found suffering from the effects of a shot, but it is still living and is not expected to die. A claim has also been lodged on behalf of Mr. Micheal Casey, of Ruan, for £10 for the loss of a bullock, which was found on his lands lying in a pool of blood with a leg broken. It was found that there was a severe cut on the limb, which severed some of the arteries.

St. Petersburg, Monday. Seven lives were lost in a fire which broke out last night in a suburb of St. Petersburg. Five were killed by jumping out of fifth storey windows of the burning building, and the other two were suffocated by smoke. The firemen succeeded in saving six persons, who were in an unconscious state, but subsequently recovered.—Reuter.
