The anniversary dinner of the St. Patrick's Orphan
Society took place at Swinburn's Hotel yesterday evening,
when a great muster of the friends of this Charity was
apparent. Upwards of 100 sat to table, and the little
Orphans on the establishment were paraded round the room
before their benefactors when the cloth was removed.

Patrick's day a boy, about thirteen years of age, was
found lying in a lane off Denmark street, in a state of
insensibility from intoxication. He was brought to Barring-
ton's Hospital, where the stomach-pump was successfully
employed for his relief—he went out well next morning.—
The boy it appears got sixpence from his parents, and it
was with whiskey purchased by the money he became
stupidly drunk.

Monday night last, a young man named Gleeson, a servant
was killed by a blow of a stone in a drunken affray at
Parteen.

Sunday last the Mayor held two inquisitions, one upon
the body of Michael M'Namara, who was found drowned
near the Sally-grove, Sir Harry's-Mall, that morning. He was
a field-labourer from Crosagalla in the Liberties, and had
been drinking in a public-house on the Park-road the evening
of the night on which it is thought he fell, or was thrown
into the River near three weeks ago. Surgeon Franklin was
examined as to injuries on the man's person, and he observed
a contusion over the right eye, but no fracture or hurt that
would cause death. A female swore she heard a man crying
for mercy the night M'Namara was missed, but did not see
any one; it was in the direction of Park-river. The affair is
yet involved in mystery, and the Jury were not justified in
finding any other verdict than "Found drowned."—The
other subject was Joan M'Namara, an aged woman, who
died in Barringtons' Hospital from the blow of a stone on the
head in affray at Corbally six weeks past.

The first general annual meeting of the Limerick Emi-
grants' Friend Society was held on Monday last, Samuel
Dickson, Esq. in the chair, when the report of the Committee's
proceedings for the past year, referred to the various sources
of useful information that had been opened for Colonial
emigrants, and the publications issued by them in Limerick
and the surrounding counties. The demand for agricultural
labour in America appears to increase. The income of the
Limerick Emigrants Friends' Society in course of their
operations for the year has been £102, and the expenditure
£80. The report was received, and thanks voted to the
Committee for their successful exertions.
