HOUSE OF COMMONS.

THURSDAY, March 14.
The Speaker reported that the House had elected the Lord Lieutenant in the Peers, where his Excellency was to make a speech to both Houses of which he said, to prevent misapprehension, he had obtained a copy, which he read and the same was afterwards read at the table.

The speech had been read, and the Speaker proposed to move the preface of his motion with observation from the throne, informing of the happy recovery of our most happy Sovereign from his late severe indisposition, and to afford every man the highest satisfaction, who is rendered peculiarly his country, from the many benevolences obtained under his reign. He then read an address (which he read in his own name) to his Majesty.

Hon. Mr. LATOUCHE seconded the motion made by the noble Viscount. He said, every of our gracious Sovereign from his late severe indisposition, must be a most unfortunate malady, must be a joy and gladness to every man in the Kingdom, and he was confident that the House would not only meet the unanimous wishes of that House, but also of the People.

The Speaker expressed the most heartfelt joy on the joyful tidings of the happy recovery of our beloved Sovereign. The speech, he observed, was so worded, and with such unanimity; and from the manner in which it was seconded, it met with his most hearty concurrence.

Last night was exhibited at Stephen's-green, in honour of his Majesty's recovery, the most extensive and magnificent fire-works. They commenced about a quarter past eight o'clock, and continued until ten. Before the display of fire-works commenced, a Royal salute of 21 guns was fired by the train of artillery, and succeeded by three volleys, in running fire, by the regiments from the garrison, who formed a large square in the Green.
