An inquest was held on Sunday last, by John Cox, Esq. Coroner, on the body of John Halloran, who was found drowned in a trench near Kildimo. Verdict, accidental death.

On Tuesday night, fifteen men (well armed) entered Mr. Croker's house, near Clogheen, and took away three guns, a blunderbuss, gunpowder, plate, and money.

The Earl of Glengal in a letter from London, has advised the Magistrates of Tipperary, to call another meeting to memorial the Government for the Insurrection Act, as a measure to protect the well disposed inhabitants of the County.

His Grace the Archbishop of Cashel has been pleased to appoint the Rev. Richard Leisley Vaughan, Rector of Fertagh, Diocese of Ossory, to the Union of Lattin in the Diocese of Emly.

The Lord Bishop of Dromore has been pleased to present the Rev. M. Sampson, A. M. to the Vicarage of Maherally, vacant by the death of his father, the Rev. Wm. Sampson.

Catherine Quin sworn—Was talking to Martin Connors, at the fair of Glenogra, when he got a stick, (a spade tree,) and a stone successively, nothing in his hand, and was only talking to her; Bray, who is dead, gave the blow of the stick; Dunn struck him with the spade tree, and Michael gave him the blow of the stone; he fell from the blow, and, when on the ground supporting himself with his hand, got two blows of the spade tree, and a stone; his right hand was broken; identifies Michael Jeremiah Dunn; saw Martin Connors dead in the next morning.

Cross-examined—On her oath all the liquor she the day of the fair was one tumbler of porter; opposite a tent where she had been selling gin; the affray took place; he was not three yards from when he was struck; was examined at the inquest and swore informations.

James Bennett, Esq. sworn—Held an Inquest as Coroner, on the body of Martin Connors; no one saw the deceased on that occasion; none could identify there was a desperate cut on the head which was made and the right arm was broken; the bones of the hand as if crackling under the pressure of his hand.

The case for the Crown terminated, and James Bennett was sworn for the defence—Lives at Ballycally; knows the general character of Catherine Quin; he does not think her worthy of credit on her evidence in case of life and death.

Cross-examined by the Crown Counsel—Witness has been in custody for a moment only in opposition to a traint of cattle for tithes; Mr. Ingram had no objection for that distraint; witness was on the Jury at Martin's inquest, and then believed Catherine Quin to be worthy of credit, although he found a verdict of manslaughter; he could not do otherwise; he knew she was killed, and there was no witness to contradict her evidence; swears she did not mention then the names of the persons she mentioned here to-day; he did not believe her testimony then more than now, although he gave a verdict on her evidence at the inquest.

By the Court—On that occasion she accused Michael Dunn, but no other of the prisoners; the verdict was against Michael Dunn, and persons unknown; Catherine Quin to be charged with bigamy, and she was reckoned a woman of loose character in the county.

Patrick Cahill sworn—Saw the deceased stretched on the fair, and Catherine Quin was not present; swears she saw one of the prisoners struck him; was at the fair all day; there was no fighting, and no blow struck; she was defending a man from Dromore, when he was struck; the prisoners were forty yards off in the County.
