persons retailing spiritous liquors who did not
keep victualling houses—secondly, to the com-
pelling all retailers in the capital to pay a li-
cense of 20l. per annum; all persons in the
county 10l.; in all other cities and towns 8l.;
and in counties at large 5l.—that houses for
the retail of spirits shall not open before sun-
rise in the morning, nor remain open after a
certain hour of the night—nor before the con-
clusion of divine service on Sundays—nor as a
meeting place for payment of journeymen or
labourers, to entice them to dissipate their
wages.—That all persons taking out licences
must have the approbation, by certificate, of a
magistrate, as orderly and proper person, and
enter into sufficient bonds for the due obser-
vance of these particulars; which bonds must
be with the commissioners of Revenue,

summoned to attend the committee,

LIMERICK.

We have received certain information, that
those wonderful productions of nature—the fo-
reign WILD BEASTS—will most certainly be in

Last Wednesday night, some villains stop-
ped, a Dealing man, near the Market-house,
and robbed him of four Guineas and a gold
Watch.

Last week, the following uncommonly hor-
rid murder was perpetrated at Fuorovore, in
the Barony of Glaneroug, County Kerry. Da-
niel Sullivan, being in possession of said farm,
stocked it with cows, and his brother James
Sullivan repeatedly carried them off. At length
the latter and younger brother, insisting on
building on the farm, Daniel informed him he
should not; on which James carried a loaded
Blunderbuss and shot his brother dead on the
spot; after which he made his escape.
