incorporated, delaying or discontinuing for a certain term the making of the line."

To both those stipulations, which are little more than the same requirements in varied forms, the following counter-stipulation was given by the Limerick and Waterford Company, and is marked No. 4 :—

"That in the event of any circumstance arising to cause the non-completion of that part of the Waterford and Limerick Railway between the point of Junction into the Great Southern and Western Railway and the City of Limerick, so as to prevent the use of the same by the Great Southern and Western Railway Company, on or before the first day of January, 1848, then it shall be referred to the Railway department of the Board of Trade, with full powers to decide and to enforce what should be equitable to be done, so as to ensure the rights of the Great Southern and Western Railway Company."

The facts, as regards the negotiation between both companies, are now before the public, and it is fairly submitted to their judgment whether the Waterford and Limerick company should be charged with throwing any obstacle in the way of the carrying out the recommendation of the Board of Trade. Of eleven stipulations put forward by the Cashel company nine have been acceded to, and any man can form an opinion of the fairness with which the 8th and 4th stipulations have been met. Our entire wish and anxiety is to stand by the umpirage of the Board of Trade—the most competent, and the most disinterested arbitrators, to whom such matters could be submitted; and I can state, with every confidence, that the Waterford and Limerick Company are equally desirous with the Dublin and Cashel, to have that portion of the line from Tipperary to this City completed in the shortest time possible.

The Public are now satisfied that the Railway system will be fully carried out in Ireland, notwithstanding any opposition which may be given to it; and I respectfully suggest, that it becomes the duty of all to provide ample protection against those evils which have attended every undue monopoly of railway lines in England, and that, now aimed at by the Great Southern and Western Railway Company is scarcely less gigantic than any of those so loudly condemned in the sister country; in fact, it seems as if that company will only be propitiated by the uncontrolled sovereignty of all the highways in the South and West of Ireland.

Such protection can be efficiently secured by the encouraging of competing lines,—the great safety valve for the public. The Shareholders of the Waterford and Limerick line may be assured that those to whom they have confided the management of their affairs, will be vigilant in discharge of the trust reposed in them.

The following letter has been addressed by Mr. Meagher, to Peter Purcell, Esq., Chairman of the Great Southern and Western Railway :—
Waterford, 21st March, 1845.

Sir—Having seen in a Dublin Paper of yesterday a report of the half yearly meeting of the Great Southern and Western Railway Company held on the 19th Inst., at which you presided, the following paragraphs contained in what purports to be the report of the Directors as read by the Secretary.—"The terms which have been approved of by the Board of Trade, pursuant to such conditions, have been acceded to by your directors. These terms have been submitted to the Waterford Company." Now, I take leave to say, as the Chairman of the Deputation of the Waterford and Limerick Company, appointed for the purpose of making an amicable arrangement with the Great Southern and Western Railway Company that, no terms purporting to have been approved of by the Board of Trade, have been submitted to the Waterford and Limerick Company, and that on reference to the several written propositions and counter propositions made respectively on the part of the two companies, those of the Waterford and Limerick Company were more in accordance with the report of the Board of Trade, as announced in the Gazette of the 31st January, and shewed more clearly a disposition to acquiesce in the opinions of that Board, than those of the Great Southern and Western Company, and further that the deputation were and are still perfectly willing to submit all points of difference between the two companies to the Board of Trade.
