CAMPAIGN OF THE PRINCE REGENT.—The following very extraordinary piece of intelligence appeared in the *Patriot* of Thursday evening:—

"The following highly interesting piece of intelligence has been communicated to us, direct from London. We will not absolutely pledge ourselves for its authenticity, although we rely implicitly upon the character and respectability of the gentleman who has favored us with the communication:

"London—Monday evening, March 30:
"The Prince Regent has declared his intention of going to the Peninsula, and joining in the campaign against the French invaders.

"The above information I have this moment received from a person in the highest circles among the military, with whom, it was, yesterday, the sole subject of conversation."

"We give the above as we have received it, and must say for ourselves, that we are far from discrediting such a report. The event of the appearance of his Royal Highness the Regent of Great Britain upon the Peninsula, stimulating his subjects in arms, conjoined with the patriot bands of Spain and Portugal, would serve as an electric shock to the Usurper, and cause a flame to burn throughout invaded Europe, that could never never again be extinguished, but would brighten in the overthrow of the disturber of the peace of nations, and shed a long, happy, and peaceful lustre over those countries whom his ambition had laid waste and desolate, in his execrable career of aggrandizement and usurpation."—*Patriot*.
