RUGBY FOOTBALL.

Munster Cup Mems.

A Truly Sporting Instinct. By vanquishing Rookwell College on Saturday, Lansdowne qualify for final honours in the Munster Cup Competition. After much delay and voluminous correspondence, the Athletic Ground, Tipperary, was fixed for the match, and the selection was undoubtedly a good one. There was nothing to cavil at from the view point of the arena not being properly enclosed. In this respect it served the purpose alright, while the pitch was perfect in every way. In city Rugby circles the contest excited much speculation, and as such it was not surprising to find the "special" which brought down Lansdowne team, very liberally patronised. The run was an excellent one, the outward journey being covered in a shade under forty minutes.

The Invasion.

Tipperary was reached at ten minutes past three, so that the players and their followers had time to have a look round the town. It was a market day, and the presence of the Limerick contingent occasioned a mild flutter, as few of the natives, outside of those directly identified with rugby football, appeared to be cognizant of the fixture. It did not take long to dispel the mists, and the presence of the students in large numbers was an additional factor in the solution of the problem. Then Tipperary, or as many of its sporting population that could, made their way to the field, and helped to swell the number of "foreign" spectators that awaited events behind the touch lines. Very little time was lost in getting the teams into position. Lansdowne were the first to enter the arena, and met with a fine reception, while Rockwell received unstinted applause in making their appearance.

The Game.

At five minutes past four, Mr. Charles Cullinan had the teams under way. Playing against a slight wind, with the sun to their backs, Lansdowne took play momentarily to the Collegians quarter. Joy repulsed, and midfield operations ensued. The initial scrum favoured the Limerickmen, but they made no use of the accruing advantage. For ten minutes the game fluctuated and nothing of moment occurred, save that the student's backs showed themselves adepts at punting. Then there were movements and counter-movements in which the Collegians were shining lights, while the tackling of their opponents was always keen. Twice Lansdowne had their hands full in defending, and it was due to the resourcefulness of Walsh that disaster did not come their way. Half an hour had gone by before anything of note took place, and then we saw the students indulging in a beautiful passing bout which brought play down to the Lansdowne citadel. In an interchange of kicks inside the visitors quarterway Power "freed" in a favourable situation, and Leen had no difficulty in goaling. With three points against them Lansdowne essayed hard to equalise, and this was all but assured when Higgins's attempt at a penalty goal went wide. The drop out left the scene of hostilities at the centre, and the interval whistle saw the Rockwellians attacking.

The Concluding Half.

The concluding half furnished football of a superfine character. Rockwell gained preponderance of the oval immediately after the resumption, but defective tactics by Leen nullified their opportunities. For a quarter of an hour it was an even game, characterised by finished football, and some excellent back movements. From the spectators' point of view it was a match to witness. In its many phases it never
