WORK ASSIZES.

Convictions have taken place since our last report, before Judge Torrens:—Patrick Manning, for stealing three cows worth 10s.; sentence of death recorded. John, a soldier of the 37th Regiment, for stealing a chain, and seals, from Serjeant of that Regiment; to be transported immediately after conviction, the prisoner as a deserter from the Grenadier Company Hanlan, for stealing cloth from the barracks; to be transported for seven years. Mary, for counterfeiting coin; to be imprisoned. Patrick Griffin, Patrick Sullivan, Margaret Field, for stealing 6l. 17s. from Jeremiah sentenced. Michael Mullins, for stealing a sheep, was not licensed according to law. Denis Murphy, for stealing a sheep; to be transported for seven years. Patrick Guirey, for stealing a sheep; to be transported for life. James, for stealing wearing apparel from James; to be transported for seven years. John Roche, for stealing brushes from Patrick; to be transported for seven years. This was the last conviction in the County.

At the Court, before Serjeant Lefroy, the following cases were finished:—John, for stealing a sheep from William Wall; to be transported for seven years. Arthur Hennessy, for stealing a sheep; like sentence.

Records have taken place:—*Case of Patrick and Ellen Cusson, v. James, and Anna Coroney*—An ejectment for possession of the lands of Ballinacorney, and Ballyfeard, comprising a portion of the Barony of Kinnalea, County of Kerry. Plaintiff, 6d. damages and 6d. costs. An issue from the Court of Chancery had been duly executed by Mrs. Cusson, if it conveyed a sum of 639l. in trust for the defendant's nephew. Verdict in the affirmative for the plaintiff.

Cases v. Purcell—An action to recover a note passed by Defendant, and to enforce the defence rested on a plea of statute of limitations. The panel returned a verdict, and a juror was withdrawn. *Case of French v. McCarthy*, and the *Case of French*, were left to the arbitration of Mr. Leahy, and Large.

Judge Torrens disposed of the County of Kerry of which were traversed.—100l. by the Governor of the Gaol, being an amount eventually fixed after some strong objections. 3,594l. was presented for the Gaol and Sessions Houses in various parts of the County, after an observation from the Judge secured the contractors in the execution of the works should be sued for the non-performance.—His Lordship would only fix a sum of 300l. for the Gaol, and a sum of 500l. for arrears on the Town of Tralee. Judge Torrens also took a sum of 500l. for the City Gaol, and 600l. for the House of Industry. The Governor of the City Gaol was reduced to 200l. His Lordship then directed the Jury to award the sum of £500, to the Gaol, for the arrears on the Town of Tralee.

Thursday evening, Michael Shaughnessy, a ferry-man, was crushed to death by a heap of new stone work, which fell upon him at the North Strand, while employed on the verge of the river in taking eel-fry. The deceased had been a soldier in the 45th and 88th Regiments, and he left a family to lament his untimely death. An inquest was held by the Mayor, and a verdict of accidental death returned.

Mrs. Hawkshaw, a lady residing in Wexford, was burned to death on Sunday night, when going to bed, by her clothes having taken fire from a lighted candle.

On Thursday, a public dinner was given in Carlow, to Captain St. John, of the 9th Foot, on leaving to join his Regiment.

The Custom Duties received at the port of Tralee, for the month ending 5th April, amount to 13l. 14s. 4d.

A meeting of the subscribers to the Tralee Ship Canal is to take place in Tralee, on Tuesday.

The working boot and shoe makers of Tralee turned out for advanced prices.

A recent report of the Hibernian Mining Company represents their works in Kerry as most flourishing. Killarney copper mine is one of the richest in Ireland. Castlemaine lead mine is most productive, yielding six ounces of silver to each ton of ore; and the Valentia mines are working at a clear profit.

Yesterday being Good Friday, the anniversary of Lord's Passion, all the shops and public offices closed, the military attended divine service, and at several places of public worship were numerous congregations tended by their respective congregations.

The Lord Bishop of Limerick will hold his Ordination Visitation for the diocese of Limerick at the Cathedral on Thursday the 7th, and for the diocese of Ardara at the Parish Church of Tralee, on Thursday the 14th of June next.

At an Ordination held on Sunday by the Honorable and Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Waterford, the Reverend Abram Sergeant, Curate of St. Olave's, Waterford, the Rev. William Rowley Archdall, Curate of Rinsagonal, and the Rev. William Montgomery, Curate of Templetenny, all in his Lordship's diocese were admitted to the Order of Priests.

An ardent spirit for emigration pervades the manufacturing and agricultural classes, in the North and South of Ireland. Belfast is the principal outlet of the former, and Cork, Limerick, and Waterford, are crowded with vessels conveying families to America.

There are five vessels now in port, taking in passengers for various parts of America, and, with this intention, families have arrived in many instances, from the extreme points of Tipperary, Cork, Kerry, and Clare, exclusive of this County. In the present case it may be very truly remarked, that these voluntary exiles are composed of the most industrious, sober, and well-disposed portion of the Agricultural community, in whom there exists a strong passion for transatlantic emigration.

The Mayor of Cork presided on Wednesday at a Wesleyan Methodist meeting, which was attended by the Rev. Messrs. Newstead, Martin, and Waugh.

The Rev. Mr. Newstead, of the Methodist Connection, is the first Christian Missionary, who preached the Gospel in the Kingdom of Candy, in the Island of Ceylon.
