Several members spoke, and different amendments were made in the clauses, which were all gone through, and the bill ordered to be reported on Wednesday next, if ingrossed.

A very general report prevailed yesterday in the City, though certainly not entitled to the smallest degree of credit, that a truce had been agreed on between the Empress of Russia and the Turks, as a preliminary to the settlement of a general peace. This rumour owes its origin to a letter received by a mercantile house in the city from Manheim in Germany which very confidently asserts the news to be a fact; and such was the rage for gambling in the Alley, that Consols fluctuated in the course of the day from 77 5-8th to 79 1/2, and left off at 8th. We can take upon us to say that no news is known among those persons who generally best informed in Continental affairs; and we should not have noticed the report if it had not had an effect upon the funds.

The advices from the continent received by Saturday's mail, are, on the contrary, of a very different tendency; and if we may judge from actual preparation, the parties the most concerned consider a war as very certain. The King of Prussia is making very considerable expences in fitting out his army, especially in the artillery. The ordnance department in Berlin was never more actively employed. Bombs, heavy cannon, and batteries have been the most required.

The Empress is not less vigilant in procuring the best possible defence against so potent a rival; and as Riga will probably be the first object of his Prussian Majesty's attack, she has sent thither 500 heavy cannon, with other necessary stores, and has considerably augmented the garrison.
