

BLAND.—It was yesterday reported in a confidential situation in the Bank, into custody, on a charge of having forged Bills, that had been bought in, the following are the particulars of the transaction:—

Cornhill, some time ago, sold to the Bank, certain Exchequer Bills which had been put into his hands for the purchase of Exchequer Bills were, of course, deposited in the care of the cashiers, by whom they were to be sold for the purchase. In the end of the month of these Bills were brought to Mr. Bish. Upon examination, Mr. Bish found that every bill which he had lately sold to the Bank, Mr. Cowell.—He was surprised to find that they were merely some mistake in the matter of the Bank, or its servants. On the next morning he went to the Bank, and enquired for certain Exchequer Bills, which he had not been actually bought in by the cashiers, and upon enquiring to their books, he was informed that they had been bought. He desired to know if they had been issued again? To which the answer was—No; it was contrary to the object of the purchase, which was to get rid of the market. He then shewed that it was impossible to conceive the person who had been traced to the person in official trust, next only to the faithful and broken Abraham Newland. His Assistant, whom he had introduced, and cherished like a son, was taken into custody, and lodged in the Poultry Compter. Yesterday he underwent two private examinations before Brook Watson, Esq; and one of the Directors of the Bank, and a minute examination took place. It appeared that this person, a man of modest habits, who has been brought up from under the immediate care and favour of Abraham Newland, has lived, for the last few years, in lodgings; and, with an income of £1000 a year, has not, apparently been in the habit of expending more than 200l. has never been puzzled lately, according to report, to account for not less than between 3 and 400,000l. of the property entrusted to his official trust, and he said that the abstraction of securities was confined to Exchequer Bills. It is not probable that his error is to be attributed to any other than speculating in the funds, amidst the various situations ruinous to so many of the best.—He earnestly intreated to be left in custody till Monday next. His request could not be complied with. At his final examination he was fully committed for trial. The punishment for his crime is, by a late act, Death.
