A vessel has arrived at the port of Cork, from Ame-
rica with American papers to the 19th ult. We have
not been able to discover any important intelligence
thus derived, unless importance be attached to what we
know to be false, or to what we knew before. It is
said that an account had been received at the island of
St Thomas, so long as the 11th of Feb, that a Cork
convoy had been taken by a French squadron of eight
sail of the line and eight frigates! This cannot be true.
It is also said that the late hostile measure of Congress
towards England was only a non-importation act and
not a non-intercourse act, but this was stated in the ex-
tracts from the American papers which appeared in the
Cork Advertiser of last Tuesday.—*Cork Advertiser.*

An officer of the 14th Dragoons, who arrived at
Plymouth, from Lisbon, on the 17th inst. states that
Lieut Bourke, of the 45th Regiment, was tried and
honorably acquitted, on the charge of Desertion to
the enemy.

On Saturday night the Jalonsie sloop of war, Captain
Morris, arrived at Cork, which before day brake on
that day fell in with the Armide frigate, from which
he received information that she had just before spoke
with Sir Home Popham's ship at sea, and been inform-
ed by him that he had met with a packet from Corunna
bound for England with dispatches, the purport of
which was, that the Spaniards had defeated a large bod-
dy of French troops (Ney's corps it was supposed) but
we should think it more likely that it was some division
of the enemy's force in the North of Spain.

by the Rt. Hon. Lord Muskerry, marched on Tuesday
evening from Athlone, to replace the South Mayo at
Mullingar, Granard, &c.

The Clare regt. commanded by Colonel the Honble.

are replaced by the Donegal militia, from Tuam.
