At Woodlawn Cottage, Newcastle, on Sunday, the 24th inst.,
 aged 73 years, Robert Carte, Esq. To portray the qualities of
 this truly estimable man would far exceed the limits of our
 obituary. During the whole period of a long life he possessed the
 character of "an honest man, the noblest work of God"—an
 affectionate and fond husband and parent, and a sincere, kind
 friend. Among his family and acquaintance his edifying con-
 versation and amiable manners were the delight of all, and will
 cause his memory to be long cherished in their hearts. To the
 last moment, although labouring under much bodily suffering,
 he retained not only full enjoyment of his faculties, but the true
 spirit and language of a Christian, and departed this life a faith-
 ful example of pious resignation, virtue, and purity of heart,
 relying with confidence on the merits and sacrifices of the
 Redeemer, "which alone is able to make wise unto salvation."
 His remains were interred, on Tuesday morning, at Churchtown,
 Newcastle, when the Rev. Mr. Curtis took occasion to deliver a
 most impressive lecture and deserved tribute to departed worth.

 lamented, Thomas Alexander Odell, Esq. of Odellville, who for-
 merly served the office of High Sheriff of this county.
 On Sunday morning, the 24th inst. to the inexpressible grief of
