A Meeting of the County of Dublin is convened for Thursday next, at which the High Sheriff will preside, for the purpose of petitioning Parliament against the proposed measure of increasing the Stamps on Newspapers. The County Kildare meets next week to petition against Poor Laws.

At a special meeting of the Newspaper Reporters of Dublin on Saturday, at the Masonic Coffee-House, a series of resolutions were passed, condemnatory of the great increase of taxation upon the Irish Press, contemplated by Government.

It is said that Sir Patrick Bellew will start for the County Louth, in place of his brother the Counsellor, against Mr. Sheil.

Dr. Butson, Lord Bishop of Clonfert, is on the recovery. Lord Lorton has commenced the formation of a Canal near his splendid seat, Rockingham, county Roscommon, and 100 labourers are now employed in the excavation.

A number of persons were dispossessed of their holdings on the lands of Sir Robert Hudson, in the County of Cavan, on the 24th ult., and their cabins levelled to the ground.

Information is taken against two Officers of the 9th Regiment, at Belfast, for assault in the streets. The Edenderry Cup will be run for the 13th of May.

Mr. Farrell, who distinguished himself against the toll system, was last week, at the Sessions of Kells, County Meath, convicted of a riot, and sentenced to four months' imprisonment.

ADMINISTRATION OF JUSTICE IN IRELAND. "Fitzwilliam-street, Dublin, 3d, March, 1830.

"SIR—As it is likely that several trials, arising out of yearly quarrels, will take place at Enniskillen next Assizes; and as it is very desirable that there should be no pretence for complaint, as to the formation of the Juries, by either party, it is the Attorney-General's particular wish, that you cause to be summoned for the Crown Court at the ensuing Assizes, a panel of the most respectable freeholders of your County, Protestant and Catholic, without religious distinction—I have the honor to be, Sir, your very obedient servant, "EDWARD TIERNEY, "Crown Solicitor.

"To the High Sheriff of the County Fermanagh, Enniskillen."

"Enniskillen, 12th March, 1830. "SIR—I have been favoured with a letter from you, respecting the summoning of jurors to attend the next Assizes for the County Fermanagh, in reply to which I beg to inform you, that I have addressed a letter to Mr. Gregory upon the subject—I have the honor to be, Sir, your obedient servant, "A. F. CRAWFORD, "High Sheriff of Fermanagh.

"To Edward Tierney, Esq. &c. &c. "15, Fitzwilliamstreet, Dublin. Copy of a letter from the High Sheriff to Mr. Gregory, Secretary's Office, Dublin Castle, upon receipt of the Crown Solicitor's letter:—

"Enniskillen, 12th March, 1830. "SIR—I have received a letter from the Crown Solicitor of the North West Circuit, communicating to me, that it is 'the particular wish of the Attorney-General that I should cause to be summoned, as Jurors for the Crown Court at the approaching Assizes of this county, a panel of the most respectable freeholders, Protestant and Catholic, without any religious distinction.' I beg to state to you for the information of the Attorney-General, and the other members composing his Majesty's Government here, that in the discharge of my duty as Sheriff, I had previous to the receipt of Mr Tierney's letter made such arrangements as were sufficient to ensure the attendance as Jurors of such persons as in my judgment are fully competent to try every question which may come before them, whether as between the King and the subject, or between man and man. And I further request that you will, with the least possible delay, apprise the Attorney-General, and the other Members of his Majesty's Government, that if the duties devolving upon me as Sheriff of this County are to be prescribed by the Attorney-General, or by any other Officer of the Crown, the Patent which I have the honor to hold from his Majesty may be forthwith recalled, and another Sheriff appointed in my place. I have the honor to be, Sir, your very obedient servant, (Signed) "A. F. CRAWFORD, "High Sheriff of Fermanagh.

"To William Gregory, Esq. Dublin Castle." It is almost needless to observe, that the reply of Mr. Crawford proves him eminently qualified for the discharge of the duties of his high and important office of Sheriff. His conduct on this occasion cannot fail to serve as an example to every independent man who may in future be vested with a similar trust.—Evening Packet.

vote on the assimilation of Stamp duties bill. Yesterday was fixed for striking the Committee on the County Limerick Election Petition. There are at least fifty witnesses gone over for examination.

The Registry of County Freeholds will terminate this day; there are not more than 150 registered out of 577 who gave notice. The greater part did not appear when the roll was called over, and very few were rejected. The registries effected were principally in the interest of the O'Grady family.

There are 1,000 Civil Bill Processes entered, with which the Barrister proceeds to-day. The Quarter Sessions for the division of Tralee commenced on Tuesday. The number of the Processes entered amounts to 2419, and of Civil Bill ejectments 53. The Criminal business is not particularly heavy.

At Clonmel Quarter Sessions, 1737 Civil Bills were disposed of by the Barrister.—The criminal business commenced on Monday. A person from Nenagh was committed on Sunday for forging a draft on a shopkeeper in Birr, with intent to defraud the Bank of Ireland here.

A few nights since the house of a man named Stapleton, near Borrisoleigh, was forcibly entered by an armed party, who fired two shots, and afterwards they fired shots into the house of a man named Britt. Four men have been taken up by Chief Constable Carroll, and committed to Clonmel gaol, for this outrage.

On Saturday evening, a female passing over the New Bridge, on her way to the Old Town, was thrown down by a horse and ear moving rapidly in the opposite direction, when one of the wheels rolled over her right leg, nearly separating the calf down from the knee to the ankle, from the bone. The poor creature was allowed to remain several minutes in this deplorable situation, when Wm. J. O'Connell, Esq. of Kilmallock, humanely procured a door and four men, and had her conveyed to the County Hospital.

A case, under the Vestry Act, has occupied the attention of the Magistrates at Petty Sessions for some time past, and was finally adjusted on Saturday last before the Recorder, by which the Church-Wardens of the united Parishes of St. Mary and St. Nicholas are authorized to levy a proportion of Church Rates on Lands and Premises in St. Nicholas's Parish, heretofore exempt or neglected to be enforced, and which must lighten the burden on St. Mary's. The case was conducted by T. W. Monsell, Attorney, on the part of the Church-Wardens.

The executioner left the County Gaol early this morning for Ennis, where it is apprehended his services are required to-day. There are twenty-three males and two females in the City Cork Gaol, under rule of transportation. An order is daily expected for the removal of the former to the Hulk at Cove.

There are one hundred and thirty-three female convicts at the Penitentiary in the City Cork, awaiting the arrival of a vessel, which is daily expected, to convey them to Botany Bay.

At the Curragh on Friday, Major Kirwan's Genoa won the Madrid stakes of 25l each, and Mr. Watts' Mount-Eagle the Wellington stakes of 30l each. On Saturday, Mr. Kelly's Regulator won the second class Madrid stakes of 25l each, beating seven horses. Mr. Watts' Mount-Eagle won the King's plate of 100 gns. for 3 years old. Lord Clannorris's Genoa the Northumberland of 20l with 75l added, and Lord Portarlington's Dandy the Corinthian stakes of 10l with 30l added.

Alderman Ackland is elected Mayor of Drogheda; Messrs. Van Homrigh and Roe, Sheriffs. A moral Governor and deputy Matron are wanted for the Cork House of Industry and Lunatic Asylum.

A spirited English Company have opened a stone-ware manufactory or pottery in Cork. The Counties of Kilkenny and Carlow are to have a grand cricket match the first week in May.

The inhabitants of Tralee have subscribed to purchase potatoes for the numerous poor in that town. The Tradesmen and Labourers employed in the new Bridge works in this City have resolved to become members of the Temperance-Society.

We are pleased to find that the laudable exertions of the Limerick Musical Club, in support of their afflicted fellow creatures, have been met with a corresponding feeling on the part of the amateurs of this City, who, in the handsomest manner, offered their assistance on the occasion of the approaching Oratorio in aid of the funds of the Society for relief of the Sick and Indigent Room Keepers. If we are to augur from the rehearsal which took place on Monday, the lovers of vocal and instrumental music may anticipate a delightful treat.
