

A Protestant pauper in the Listow workhouse has got leave to attend the parish church, as there is no Protestant chaplain, the commissioners having refused to sanction such an appointment.

The Queen held a levee yesterday at St. James's Palace. Lord Keane, late Capt. 37th, on coming to the title, was presented by the Earl of Clare, and Wm. Monsell, Esq. Limerick, by Viscount Adare.

The Chancellor of the Exchequer received a deputation from the Irish banks yesterday morning, at which the gentlemen who attended received an assurance that the small note currency is not to be abolished.

The great distillery case of the Excise against Smith, is on trial this day before the Court of Exchequer.

Major-General Lord Downes has arrived in London.

Colonel Townsend, 14th Light Dragoons, died this week, at Castletown, county Cork, of fever, having only returned last month from his Regiment in India. He was a distinguished officer, and served with the 14th throughout the Peninsular war. Brevet Lieut.-Colonel Harvey succeeds to the Lieut.-Colonelcy; Capt. Archer to the Majority, and Lieut. Griffis to the vacant troop. The late Colonel Townsend was also Aid-de-Camp to the Queen.

Lieut.-Col. Drought, 15th Regt. was received with ardent demonstrations of welcome on his visit to Lettybrook, near Kinnetty, the seat of his brother, Capt. J. H. Drought, D.L. The tenantry illuminated the surrounding country with bonfires on his arrival.

Capt. Hoey, 30th, leaves to be Paymaster 4th Light Dragoons.

Capt. Story's company, Royal Artillery, has landed in Dublin from Liverpool, to replace Capt. Glasgow's company, ordered to Woolwich.

Capt. Morrill, Royal Artillery, proceeds to Madeira, on leave.

Major Douglas, 79th, son of the Major-General commanding in Scotland, is appointed Aid-de-Camp to Lieut.-General Lord Cathcart, the newly appointed Commander of the forces in Canada.

Wednesday evening, the 32d Regiment gave a splendid ball at the Rotunda, to celebrate the event of the presentation of the New Colours to the Regt.

PROTESTANT PETITION.—Copy of a petition to both Houses of Parliament in favour of the Cabinet measure for augmenting the Maynooth grant, and which is now in course of signature by Protestants of this City:—

"The humble petition of the Protestant inhabitants of the County and City of Limerick.

"That your Petitioners have seen with great satisfaction that a Bill has been introduced into Parliament increasing the former most inadequate grant for the support of the Roman Catholic Seminary at Maynooth, and converting into a permanent charge, the vote passed every Session for the last fifty years, which, on each discussion, created irritable feelings, and thus kept alive sectarian animosities, so injurious to the welfare of society. That Petitioners are fully convinced that the grant hitherto made for support of this establishment was totally inadequate for any good purposes, and they hail with great satisfaction the prospect now held forth of a better and more liberal system of education being extended to their Roman Catholic fellow-subjects.

"That as Protestants, sincerely attached to our own religious opinions, we are fully convinced that the extension of the benefits of education as widely as possible will prove our best safeguard, and that the more the people are enlightened, the more secure basis will the truth of our own religion be placed on.

"That petitioners feel convinced that this great and wise measure of justice will tend most materially to the welfare, peace, and prosperity of the country.

"And petitioners will pray."

In the writs of error Queen v. Feehily, Meehan, Kennedy, Reynolds, Daly and Cummings, under sentence at Nenagh, Ennis, and Galway assizes, the Queen's Bench yesterday set aside the verdicts of conviction as null and void, for not having been allowed the right of challenge, as ruled by the House of Lords in the Queen v. Sam Gray. The prisoners, however, will be tried over again.
